To the Tinmouth Community,

Tinmouth students in grades K through 6 successfully led their conferences with parents this week. They shared their goals and samples of work they've completed since the start of the year. In third through 6th grade the students shared an online portfolio they utilize to hold summaries of their various projects. The staff and I are very grateful to parents for supporting their children. By attending this event, parents honor the work of the Tinmouth teachers and give students the message that what they do at school matters.

Caiden Rochon and Bryce Cook presented a PowerPoint at the Mill River Board Meeting on Wednesday, October 18th. They discussed their trip to Chimney Point Historic Park where they worked on an archeological dig for Native American artifacts.

The students in PreK though grade 3 visited Winslow Farm and learned about growing and harvesting pumpkins, gourds, and apples. Each brought home a gourd which they painted. These are on display in the classroom hallway outside Ms. Coupe's room.

The 4th through 6th grade class has set up their poetry boards in the back of the community center auditorium. Please stop by and take a look!

Our garden is starting to shape up thanks to the efforts of Hollis Squier and F.A.S. who mowed the encroaching vines that were taking over just outside the garden fence. And along the hedgerow. Thank you Mr. Squier!

Four Winds has been the highlight of our month. Under the direction of Nelson Jaquay, volunteers are bringing students out of the classroom to explore insect life cycles and fall seeds in the fields and forest surrounding the school. Our volunteers are brilliant and students are engaged and excited when Four Winds day approaches!

The Wee Folk Playground will be up and running in the spring! We received a \$2,500 Small & Inspiring Grant from the Vermont Community Foundation to be used for building a natural playground for the younger students at Tinmouth School! We'll be looking for materials such as bark chips, cedar posts, lawn fabric, and lumber. We also will be asking folks in the community to volunteer to help build this play area in the spring of 2018. Through its Small and Inspiring grants program, the Community Foundation hopes to help foster the spark and hope that keeps Vermonters healthy and happy by finding and supporting projects where a small grant can make a big difference.

~ Library Celebration Was Great Fun! ~ By Gene Usher

Did you know that the history of the Tinmouth Library goes back more than 100 years? That's right. In 1916, thanks to the efforts of interested townspeople, the Tinmouth Free Library came into being with a few loaner books on the shelves! The Town Reports, covering several years from the 1920s to the 1950s, chronicle the library's history. It was located in the attic of the Tinmouth Church which burned in November, 1968. During some of those years, the library boasted an inventory of nearly 2,000 books!

Nelson Jaquay related this history to the group of townspeople who gathered in celebration of the Library. He added one of his own poignant memories of, during the fire, seeing the pages of the burned books floating in the air.

The current incarnation of the Library began more than twenty years ago, when Ruth Drachman asked if she might use the back room of the Town Office for a children's story hour. Town Clerk Gail Fallar said certainly she could, "But we might want to clean it up a bit!" We all know the outcome of that conversation, as Ruth has done a wonderful job as librarian.

These were just a few of the memories shared by the group who gathered on October 14.

We also enjoyed a bit of singing, led by Nelson, and other stories from various people. There were yummy refreshments, provided by the Library Trustees. Pictures and videos were taken by Vito Macaluso.

All in all it was a fun time and a great way of recognizing and celebrating the past and the present of Tinmouth Library!

Ed. Note \sim A bit more history . . . After the Church burned and the library was gone, a new library was created in the back of the "old store" (hadn't yet become the Town Office) in the late 1970's – it was a children's library, the brain child of local carpenter Jack Szanto.

Anne Lewis, Susan Mackey, Nelson Jaquay, and others were instrumental in getting it up and running. Lorraine Balestra was part-time librarian for a while.

After the school was required to have its own library, it mostly went into hibernation until Ruth Drachman started working at the Town Office in the mid 1990's, and asked about starting a story hour. It now provides books and services for all ages! Many volunteers pitched in to clean, paint, make curtains, sort books, etc. to bring it back to life. Ruth has received many grants to purchase books, videos, CD's, shelving, theme bags, programming, visiting authors, etc.

The celebration was mostly to honor Ruth for her 20 years of dedication, hard work, and enthusiasm and to thank her for her tireless volunteer efforts and service to the Library on behalf of the Tinmouth community.

The challenge is that the real thing does not always meet our expectations or hopes. Gatherings of family and even friends can be challenging. Meeting Highlights ~

Select Board ~ 10/12/17

Present were members Matt Patry, Cathy Reynolds, and Frank Sears, as well as Eric Buffum-Road Commissioner, Sunny Hance, Grant Reynolds, Kim Harbaugh, Sherry Johnson, Joe Frankiewicz, Hollis Squier, Ingrid Lepley, and Gail Fallar-Board Assistant

Eric reported that the Gulf Road (Class 4 portion) is now open, Pent Road is passable though there are some culverts that are crushed, but should work for a while; the town will need to replace eventually. The Lloyds and their co-owners are working with a contractor to upgrade some of that road. He also noted that he is waiting for Fuller Sand & Gravel to complete the gravel shouldering on the new reconstructed and paved portion of Route 140.

In other road discussion, Gail advised that the Rutland County Sheriff's Department may be able to conduct a traffic study on the East Road.

Printed copies of Options A, B, and C of the Master Plan were handed out. Cathy noted that the town may have to bond for \$500,000 in addition to the \$322,000 currently in the Capital Building Fund. The town had never bonded before. She also advised that the grant application for a salted sand shed was denied (not close enough to the Class 1 wetland - > than 250' and too expensive).

Size of the salt shed was discussed – currently they can only hold three loads, need much more due in part to weather changes over the past years – used to snow and be cold all winter, now there are many thaws creating ruts if not salted and there is the expectation of roads being clear – not packed snow cover.

Frank urged caution, not doing this in a rush, but noted need to move forward. The town garage is the biggest must – the current facility is too small, not enough storage or work area and there is no water or septic facilities as required by law.

Members discussed the options: Option A has traffic concerns, transfer station is still on the southern end, garage nearer the road and requiring a berm - everyone decided it was not viable. Option B had a right of way across private property which the owner has declined to provide, eliminates much of the future recreation area. Option C moves the transfer station closer to the road (discussion about compactors and whether it might smell), covers the current sand pile, and moves the town garage to the rear. Some concern with pipe currently under the easterly side of the driveway near the road.

Shrewsbury and Mt. Holly have built new garages in the past few years, \$550,000 to \$750,000. Phase I could be the town garage, move the transfer station and purchase or rent compactors, build a salt building that can be added onto at a later date to include the salted sand pile.

Some folks wondered about building onto the current town garage, it has been mentioned that it could be as expensive as building new and still have an old building at the center.

Members discussed the transfer station, compactors would make recycling easier – zero sort for all recycling – paper would not have to be sorted; more time for the road crew to do road work (currently the road crew spends 3 or 4 hours per week on trash/recycling stuff). The Solid Waste and Recycling Committee is working on a chart for hauling, tonnage of trash and recycling. It was also mentioned that funding for this could be from the General Fund side of the Capital Building Fund – transfer station expenses are currently paid for from the general fund, not highway budget.

Board decided to hold a public forum to try to gather more input on the Master Plan and set a date of Thursday, October 26th, with the intention of inviting as many builders and construction guys as can be mustered. Could the town/volunteers do come of the work? Does someone have a better idea?

Gail presented Board with email from Stephanie Lorentz, Esq. regarding the Affordable House on Sugar House Lane – how is the affordability value determined? Ingrid, a neighbor, expressed concern with past inhabitants of the property. Sunny advised that they are trying to lease to own and the bank won't allow affordable housing to be rented. Board voted to get legal counsel for this matter.

Risk Assessment and ATV use of town roads, no action, tabled until next meeting.

Cathy noted again, that the Personnel Policy needs to be reviewed by the Vermont League of Cities and Towns (VLCT) before the Board starts negotiations with employees in the coming months.

Gail reported Ann and Nancy are compiling information for FEMA regarding the town's request for financial help following the big storm on July 1st.

Board reviewed FY 17 end of year reports, both highway and general budgets were under spent, but revenues were also under budget by nearly \$20,000.

Board reviewed FY18 budget to date report. Storm damage account is still missing Holcomb's invoice for gravel/fill for McCoy Road.

Board discussed the school's water leak problem, water meters at the fire house and school clearly show there is a leak, it is just not surfacing anywhere at the moment.

Cathy advised that MRUUSD is willing to pay for plowing the Church yard and for mowing the ball field during the summer months. Board voted to wait until next fiscal year to start charging the school for trash removal.

Select Board ~ 10/26/17 ~ Special Meeting

Present were members Cathy Reynolds, Matt Patry, and Frank Sears as well as Eric Buffum-Road Commissioner, Stan Wilbur, Doug Fontein, Pat Psholka, Chuck Bronk, Tracy Byford, Grant Reynolds, Jo Reynolds, David Birdsall, Helen Mango, Joe Frankiewicz, Kim Harbaugh, Sherry Johnson, Sunny Hance and daughter Samantha, and Gail Fallar-Board Assistant.

Frank called the meeting to order and thanked everyone for coming, explained that the Select Board has been working on upgrading highway and transfer station issues for quite some time and would like input on moving forward.

Maps indicating Options B and C were distributed, discussion of pros and cons of each were discussed. Issues concerned neighbors interests, separating transfer station and highway functions, complying with state rules/laws, what requirements must be met regarding transfer station functions (locked gate or locked compactors), composting requirements, salt shed needs (current is too small to hold more than one storm's worth), covering the sand pile, sizing the garage correctly, whether the projects could be phased or should be done all at once, etc.

Stan inquired whether there could be an Option D – finding a different site entirely for the town garage functions, suggesting a flat spot on the East Road or north of the town center on Route 140. Based on a straw poll, the Board decided to inquire via Tales of Tinmouth and Front Porch Forum to see if there was any interest.

Next steps – the Select Board needs to pick an option, finalize the Master Plan, and move forward with engineering and architectural design bids. In the end, voters will be presented with a bond vote to decide whether to borrow the money to complete the projects.

Matt thanked everyone for their input, noting that the Board is trying to find the balance that is right for the town and best for the long term.

Planning Commission ~ 10/19/17

Present were members Bob Lloyd, Michael Fallar, Vito Macaluso, Kevin Ruane, Kim Harbaugh, and Grant Reynolds, as well as Gail Fallar, Secretary

Gail reported that Amanda Chisamore advised she had taken a second job and would no longer be able to attend meetings and was resigning from the PC.

Members discussed work plan for the next year – deciding to work on amendments to the zoning and subdivision regulations to bring them in line with the newly adopted town plan. This includes removing Planned Unit Development (PUD's). They will also consider amending administrative review authority for the zoning administrator in regards to deck set back requirements in the lake shore district. Historic houses falling into disrepair – is there anything the PC can do to address this to encourage property owners or others to find a way to re-hab them? Village Center Designation might also help infrastructure grant applications. And lastly, consider working on an Enhanced Energy Plan – most felt it would be more prudent to wait and see – let other towns do it and venture before the Public Utilities Commission (formerly the Public Service Board) to see if it makes a difference in the permit process.

Members discussed the affordable housing question regarding Sugar House Lane – what is the town's responsibility. Members discussed finding a replacement for Amanda and perhaps another member who no longer attends meetings. Bob will work on a blurb for Front Porch Forum and *Tales of Tinmouth*.

Members decided to not hold a meeting in November (some members work on Game Supper preparations) or December (too close to Christmas). Next meeting was set for Thursday, January 18, 2018, 7:00 pm. Start time was changed back to 7:00.

Conservation Commission ~ 10/16/17

(With thanks to Chuck Bronk, Secretary)

Present were members Doug Fontein, Ann Czar, Jo Reynolds, Nelson Jaquay, Robbie Leeds, and Chuck Bronk, as well as Gail Fallar.

Old Business:

Chuck gave an update from a web search on commercially available Amphibian Crossing Signs. While a wide variety of standard signs are available both for amphibians and reptiles, there are not a great many that represent the diversity on our custom signs. Costs for standard 18" x18" signs range from \$12-\$25 without sign poles. Custom signs are more expensive and most users quote the installed cost for a custom sign complete with double poles to be around \$100. Consensus was reached that we should spend no more than \$50. Robbie agreed to explore what would be available from a local design firm and Chuck agreed to forward the standard design that everyone agreed upon, so that it could form the basis for an estimated cost.

Doug reported on the progress made on the Ridge Trail on the most recent work day, September 9th. Trail was cleared and blazed from the Gilmore property south for approximately ½ mile. Passage across the Gilmore property was reported by Ann to be easy to follow from North to South but difficult on the reverse path. Gail suggested a possible volunteer for trail extension, Doug Inkley, a yearly visitor to Tinmouth. Doug F. suggested an additional work day this fall with the goal of extending the trail to Miles Notch. At that point the Cabin in the purchase would still be about 1 ½ miles to the South. It was agreed that Saturday October 28th at 1 PM would be set as the next work day on the upper trail. Chuck and Nelson agreed to set another time to work on the lower portion of the trail to improve the bog bridges. Once that time is set, with sufficient notice, Doug agreed to organize delivery of material to site.

Doug also reported on improvements to the Purchase Loop and the Tinmouth Mountain Cabin. He noted that Pent road has been considerably improved and is now passable to the summer parking kiosk. The work day crew completed the toilet and the compost bin installation. All that remains is the installation of hardware cloth to keep animals out of the compost bin. Doug circulated an operations guide to the use and maintenance of the toilet for discussion. It was suggested that a permanent mark be made on the buckets to indicate the point at which they should be dumped, cleaned and replaced. In addition, for winter use, spraying the bucket with compostable oil might ease the cleaning process if the contents are frozen.

A discussion of ways to improve participation in Green Up day followed. It was noted that the Tinmouth School participation on Friday may be leading to less participation on Saturday. Nelson agreed to promote Saturday participation at multiple Friday Roundups. Doug agreed to resurrect the prizes awarded for various items collected on Green Up day and all agreed that the ice cream at the close of the collection should continue

New Business:

Doug and Robbie reported on their attendance at the Select Board meeting and their sense of the Board's focus on matters other than recreational use of the remainder of the Transfer Station parcel. It was their sense that logistical problems with recreational use of the back portion of the site would prevent its consideration until the more pressing issues of recycling, transfer station and town garage were settled.

Doug reviewed the Northwoods Stewardship Center for members unfamiliar with it, but has not yet made contact with the group.

Nelson provided an update on the Drachman trails. Plans are to take advantage of Peter Drachman's knowledge of the trails, when he is visiting next, to get them flagged. The possibility of a work day was discussed.

Solid Waste and Recycling Committee ~ 10/4/17

(With thanks to Helen Mango, Secretary)

Present were members Gail Fallar, Rick LaCroix, Jonathan Czar, Helen Mango (secretary), and Alan Held. Gail spoke with the Select Board and was asked to look up several years' worth of hauling and disposal costs

Recycling: FY '15, 15 hauls. FY '16: 14 hauls; FY '17: 11 hauls.

Trash: FY '15: 11 hauls. FY '16: 10 hauls. FY '17: 10 hauls.

Alan asked about the possibility of compacting the recyclables to save on hauling. We currently haul about 12 tons per year, so the paper that is currently sorted and sent to CANUSA (sometimes we get paid and sometimes we have to pay) and amounts to 13 tons would need to be added to this program to make it more feasible, still the hauling would be reduced to 4 or 5 times per year.

Danby's costs are \$230/month for each of two compacters. \$106/ton paid to Casella and Rutland County Solid Waste District for processing. They pull weekly. Their dues to Rutland County Solid Waste District are much higher than ours.

For disposal we currently pay \$66/ton trash and \$48/ton recycling. We pull once a month or less frequently. \$1500-1800 per year is our dues to SWAC.

Gail will have Ann or Nancy summarize the last three years of data for all costs, tons hauled, etc., to see if renting or buying compacters will be cost effective. Gail will present the results to the Select Board at their next meeting and send the summary to the SWARC as well. It currently appears that compacters will not be costeffective. We keep paper out of the zero-waste recycling (it gets hauled separately) to keep hauling costs down.

Rick has installed white boards at the Transfer Station to remind people of what goes where. The biggest problem remains plastic bags.

<u>Ordinance</u>: Pam Clapp of the SWAC made some suggestions that have been incorporated. The ordinance will now go to the Select Board for their approval.

<u>Website</u>: We will work with SWAC to have links to Tinmouth's town website to keep information up to date. Helen will work with Cathy Reynolds to update solid waste and recycling information on the town website.

Next meeting of the SWARC is scheduled for Wednesday, January 17, 2018, at 5:00 p.m.

Recipe Corner

Creamy Apple Squares



pkg. Pillsbury Plus yellow cake mix
c. margarine or butter
cup firmly packed brown sugar
tsp. cinnamon
apples thinly sliced

1 cup sour cream

1 egg

Preheat oven to 350. Combine cake mix and margarine or butter until crumbly. Reserve 2/3 cup for topping. Add sugar and cinnamon to reserved topping and set aside.

Press the remaining mixture onto the bottom of an ungreased 13 x 9 pan. Arrange apple slices over base. Blend sour cream and egg and spread evenly over the apples. Sprinkle reserved topping mix over all.

Bake for 25-30 minutes or until topping is golden brown and bubbly. Serve warm – refrigerate leftover.


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
