~Tinmouth Community Church~

Dear Friends,

We just celebrated Easter at the community church, with services throughout the week beforehand keeping me busy, not to mention deeply engrossed in theological thought. Things at the college are picking up speed too, as we

near the end of the semester with papers to be graded and coursework to be wrapped up in a neat package so the students have something worthwhile to show for their time and energy.

As a way of coping with all of this activity, I try to maintain a reasonably consistent meditation practice. Over the past few years I have come to count on the solid foundation that my morning meditations offer as I go about daily life. Most meditations begin with simply following one's breath, observing the in and out, and the slight pause in between, as one breath follows another. Sometimes all it takes to calm myself down when stress or worry are on the prowl, is to stop what I am doing for a moment or two and breathe. In ... out ... in ... out ... As my breathing slows and relaxes, so do I.

This week the scripture that I am working with (John 20:21-22), affirms the value of the breath too. The risen Christ breathes on his disciples and his breath has the sense of being a gift, somehow. I imagine a quiet receptiveness coming over the friends who have gathered, as they receive the breath he is offering. Then he tells them that with this breath they are also receiving the Holy Spirit, whom he refers to as "the Comforter."

I never put two and two together in quite this way before, but it is interesting to think about it. Breath and comfort are inextricably connected to one another. A deep, calm breath can give comfort in the middle of an anxiety-producing day. When you wake up in the middle of the night, hearing the slow and steady breathing of a loved one brings comfort, assuring you that all is well. So, why shouldn't the breath remind people of God's comforting presence? Why wouldn't the breath solidify, in effect, into a reminder that we are not alone in this world?

I have noticed that when someone I am speaking with becomes anxious, if I consciously slow down my breathing, they often follow suit. And with the slowing of their breath, they become calmer, more able to cope with whatever is going on. Maybe this subtle act of breathing together reminds them that they are not alone in whatever it is they are facing? Maybe it reminds them of our interconnectedness? I know it helps me, as I sit with them, attempting to offer some support, some help.

Whatever our spiritual tradition might be, and even if we don't claim one, still, we all breathe. And maybe this breathing is itself the most powerful of spiritual

truths, anyway. With our every breath, we participate in the common religion of being human.

Breathe deep, you are a part of life!

I remember John Squier...

There are those who's face and being live on long after they're gone from us. John Squier is one of those people for me. I see his ruddy, weather-worn face; I feel my hand taken in a shake by his huge, work-hardened right hand. I particularly remember our shakes after services I'd conducted at The Tinmouth Church. His words of thanks and approval meant much to this rookie preacher in the seventies.

I remember the red-faced, squinting visage of Farmer John looking up from a huge pile of his vegetables for one of Vito Starinskas's Rutland Herald Magazines' covers as if he'd grown from the earth with them. J.J. was a man of the earth, and he was a gentle man, as well. I played softball with the Tinmouth men during the late 60's shortly after Betti and I arrived here. I can still see John's heavy, running gait legging it to first after a hit, a broadshouldered bear of a man.

I remember John and others of "the Squier outfit" going by in one of the old Ford pickups that seemed to run well beyond their normal truck lifetimes: carrying hay or milk cans to Granville after bulk tank regulations were passed in Vermont or, wearing an old straw hat, selling corn from the back in Mill Village or on the corner in West Rutland.

One of my favorite memories of John happened in one of my first years teaching 7th and 8th grade in the basement room of the Tinmouth School. It was an election year, and I had invited someone from each of the presidential campaigns to come and speak for the candidate. John came first supporting George Wallace that year. He presented, answered questions, placed a poster on the wall and left. Probably it was the next day that Supt. Edson Phelps came down the stairs on his weekly visit. When he saw that poster (The other candidates weren't represented on the wall yet.) his face went beat red, and, in an apoplectic sputter, he blurted, "What's THAT doing on the wall?!"

What stands highest in my chain of memories from those years was the strength of character of the man. John was invariably first on the scene to meet a need in the community: do a milking, organize a haying or woodcutting for someone who had become incapacitated or organize a get-well basket or a benefit "Hootenany". ALL

of these things he'd do as quietly as possible ducking any recognition. The message to all was "This is the way you live in a community." Did not his children learn THAT lesson well?

Speaking of influence, the strongest way I became acquainted with John and Marion was through knowing their kids. Make no mistake, Marion was an equal member of that duo in everything: farming, child-rearing and all. These children were all bright-eyed healthy, intelligent beings who weren't afraid to speak their minds and defend their views. I learned later that they were expected to talk about important issues around the dinner table and then express themselves clearly and firmly. If there is an immortality it's in the lives of those Squier offspring. What would this community be without their tireless work and participation?!

We haven't even talked about J.J.'s sense of fun and joie de vivre...

Hunt Safely This Turkey Season



Vermont's spring youth turkey hunting weekend is April 29-30, and the regular turkey season is May 1-31. While Vermont's spring turkey seasons are safe (Vermont had only one turkey hunting incident in the last seven years) precautions are

needed to ensure they stay that way. Camouflage or drab colored clothing is almost mandatory to outwit a keensighted gobbler. Unfortunately, camouflage often makes it just as hard for hunters to spot one another as it does for turkeys.

"Almost all of the incidents during turkey season have been caused by hunters who didn't positively identify the target before they pulled the trigger," said Nicole Meier, with Vermont's hunter education program. "And the person they mistake for a turkey is often a friend trying to stalk a turkey call."

With the opening of spring turkey hunting season near, the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department urges hunters to consider these safety tips:

- Never shoot unless you're absolutely sure of your target and what is beyond it. Look for a beard as only turkeys with beards are legal during the spring season. If you're not sure, skip the shot. Lack of positive identification could result in shooting an illegal bird, or worse, another hunter. Be sure to have a good backstop any time you shoot a firearm or bow.
- Never stalk a gobbling turkey. Your chances of getting close are poor, and you may be sneaking up on another hunter.
- Avoid red, white, blue and black in clothing and equipment. A tom turkey's head has similar colors.
- Stick with hen calls. A gobbler call might draw in other hunters.
- **Avoid unnecessary movement.** This alerts turkeys and attracts hunters.
- Don't hide so well that you impair your field of vision
- Wrap your turkey in blaze orange for the hike back to your vehicle.
- Always sit with your back against a tree trunk, big log or a boulder that is wider than your body. This protects you from being accidentally struck by pellets fired from behind you.
- Place decoys on the far side of a tree trunk or a rock. This prevents you from being directly in the line of fire should another hunter mistakenly shoot at your decoy.

Wear hunter orange while moving from set-up to set-up. Take it off when you are in position.

When this publication (*Tales*) was first started (30+ years ago), it was written on paper and I believe it was one sheet. It was the brainstorm of my first husband, JJ Squier, and a neighbor named Cathy Ricketts who was the first editor. Gail became editor after a year or so. I don't remember how it got around town, but it kept getting bigger and bigger. It was run off on a mimeograph machine at the school. (Remember those?)

I just talked to Gail to see if she remembered. It started out as a church newsletter and as more and more people read it, meetings and minutes of the selectmen were added, general town and school news, births and deaths, etc. We may have had it printed by a shop in Wallingford. Gail can correct me on this. Somehow it got to the point where we bought paper, and eventually printed it. Then came the mailing process. Now it has grown to be a regular established paper. It is now printed at the Town Office. (Editor's note: *Tales* pays the Town for the paper and printing costs.)

I can remember when I used to write my column, print it on paper and take it to Gail at the Town Office. She was the Editor, who did everything. Proof reading, printer, sorter, and mail clerk. As the years went by, she told me I had to send my contribution by e-mail. At the time, I had a word processor upon which I was printing my story and then taking it in or mailing it. Also at the time I was traveling a lot. She talked me into learning the ins and outs of a computer, which I have been now using for years.

Somehow, this progress from paper and pencil to the present technology is really something. The things which can be done on the TV screen are amazing. One can put graphics, colors, even talk (texting) on phones, take pictures on phones, etc.

I'm afraid it is too much tech. My old brain can only absorb so much. I wonder what the next eighty years will bring. Maybe the people reading this today will be living out in space! Who knows? ~Meeting Highlights~

Select Board $\sim 4/13/17$

Present were members Cathy Reynolds, Matt Patry, and Frank Sears as well as Eric Buffum – Road Commissioner, Kim Harbaugh, Sherry Johnson, Laurie Phillips, Grant Reynolds, Gregg and Tina Casey, James Casey, Lindsay Baker, and Gail Fallar – Board Assistant.

Board reviewed agenda, added certification of road standards and PACIF grant application with Danby. They re-arranged the agenda to let "others" proceed first.

James Casey requested Town approval for a 'nano' brewery to be located at the Tinmouth Snack Bar. He intends to brew craft beers on site – one 31-gallon barrel at a time - provide a tasting room serving 3 oz. samples and selling growlers for offsite consumption. Property owners Gregg and Tina approve, they currently are licensed to sell beer and wine there. Any wastewater generated will be transported to the City of Rutland for disposal at their water treatment plant. Board members questioned what authority they have in the matter as state and federal authorities are the regulators. James advised the feds need to know there is local approval. There was some discussion whether a zoning permit would be required, Gail as Zoning Administrator advised no, the business is within an existing business and is not a change of use. Board voted to approve motion that the Town is supportive of this project and James is moving forward with it.

Jan Krantz advised that the Tinmouth Community Fund had approved a \$500 grant to build a community bake/pizza oven. She introduced the idea and asked for preliminary approval for it to be constructed on town property. She will seek input via Front Porch Forum for volunteers to develop a plan to bring back to the Board – i.e. should it be built of brick or clay, what will be the use and safety guidelines, should it be locked, location, etc. It was suggested that folks could bake pizza the nights of the Old Firehouse Concerts to raise money for local organizations. One possible location discussed was between the Old Creamery and the Town Office. Board voted to approve investigating this proposal further.

Cathy updated the Board on the proposed location of flowering crabapple trees on the Town Green – most likely they will be planted between the fence and the road, more details at a later date.

Laurie noted that the garbage on Mountain View Road has not been removed. Frank will try to deliver letter within the week.

Eric advised that they are busy patching potholes, will start grading gravel roads soon. He advised the Board that he is looking into changing the cutting edges of the grader blades to stinger bits (round teeth) as opposed to the straight steel edges now used (\$300 each, went through four last year). \$2500 cost but will only need to be replaced every four years. Board suggested waiting until the FY18 budget year starts.

Board discussed paving grant application – will include reconstruction/reclamation of half mile of Route 140 starting just north of the center, as well as continuing shim and top coating further along Route 140 towards the

intersection of Route 133. Board voted to apply for the Class 2 Highway grant.

Stan Wilbur sent apologies, as the RFP for the town garage is not yet ready; he's still working on it.

Matt advised that his nephew would like to visit the town garage site in the next couple of weeks to take a gander and provide some preliminary advice regarding site work, i.e. septic location. He also noted that there is now a metal building being made that is much better insulated.

Board discussed invoice from Earle's Trucking regarding loose lug nuts on the rear wheels of one of the tandem trucks – they came loose (or were never tightened following recent brake work) and caused major damage. Difficult to prove, Eric bought a torque wrench to prevent this from happening again. After discussion, Board voted to authorize Eric to negotiate with Earle's regarding the bill, would they split the cost (over \$3800)? Resolution may determine future business with them.

Eric advised that he would like to apply for a safety grant from VLCT PACIF (the town's insurance company) for portable traffic signals in conjunction with the Town of Danby. These would be used in place of flaggers during ditching or construction work. Board voted to apply for this grant. There will need to be a written agreement with Danby concerning use, where they will be housed, etc.

Board reviewed Action Plan regarding the recent risk assessment inspection at the town garage/transfers station/fire house. Eric will take care of most, some will be resolved if the town garage is replaced (like providing bathroom facilities).

Board signed letters regarding appointments to RRPC, RRTC and SWARC. Board re-appointed Gail as Zoning Administrator as recommended by the Planning Commission. Frank volunteered to continue to be the Board liaison with the Tinmouth Pond Milfoil Project. Under Old Business, Board reviewed proposed Personnel Policy, discussed whether to require employees to contribute to cost of health insurance premiums. Board decided that it would require that of new employees going forward, as well as requiring that spouses that have other health insurance available must use it. In the meantime, Cathy moved to eliminate the employee's contribution to premium from the PP and commit to negotiate with current employees for the next fiscal year (ask employees to come back with a proposal), Matt seconded, Cathy and Frank voted yes, Matt abstained. Motion passed.

Gail advised that the Tinmouth School's Parents Club had requested a transfer station punch ticket as a prize for their calendar raffle, Board voted to approve their request.

Michael Buffum has offered 40 hours of volunteer service to the town. Board voted to accept his offer, and thanked him for it

Board moved its May meeting to Wednesday, the 10th due to conflict of schedules.

Old Creamery Committee ~ 4/22/17

Present were members Vito Macaluso, Alan Held, Michael Fallar, Grant Reynolds, and Doug Fontein, as well as Jan Krantz, Jen Calvey, and Gail Fallar.

Jan presented information regarding the possible construction of a community bake oven and wondered if it would be possible to locate it near the old creamery. It could be used to make pizza to sell to concert-goers, or once a month or so invite folks to bring their bread to bake, etc. Members went outside for a site visit; numerous questions were raised. Jan is looking for volunteers to help with the project. Jen showed a photo of the oven she built, describing construction and use of it. No decision was made; more information is needed.

While outside, members then proceeded to the south side of the building to look at the foundation. Alan is proposing to dig it down until the foundation is solid and then remove the loose rocks and rebuild it with those rocks set in cement. Much discussion about the process, members felt a plan was needed to ensure the work was completed. Doug and Alan will prepare a scope of work.

Work on the roof – bids will be sent out with 3 scopes of work, one contractor could do all three. Work includes removal of the slate - without damaging the new standing seam porch roof; repair of the roof sub-structure – repairing fire damage, sistering of rafters, replacing roof sheathing, collar ties, repairing roof trim on east side and covering with synthetic felt; screw down tine to match color of porch roof. Gail will prepare scope of work to be reviewed via email by members, and then send to contractors in town and posted to FPF.

Members briefly discussed fundraising; there is \$3,900 in the checking account, with an additional \$5,100 pledged to date.

The next meeting will be held on May 20 to open bids and continue discussion of fundraising.

Tinmouth Planning Commission ~ 4/20/17

Present were members Michael Fallar, Bob Lloyd, Vito Macaluso, Amanda Chisamore, Kim Harbaugh, Grant Reynolds, and Andy Gilmore, as well as Michael Brown, Barbara Noyes-Pulling (Rutland Regional Planning Commission-RRPC), and Gail Fallar, Secretary.

Mike Brown was present to discuss a proposed subdivision of his 20 acres on East Road. He has a pre-existing narrow long lot; members looked at his survey and made suggestions for him to consider. He inquired about a variance of lot size. Lot sizes cannot be varied, but setbacks can. Each lot needs five acres. He will think about the options and return with a plan.

Barbara apologized for the mix-up on question #8 of the online survey monkey – though it does appear that the tabulated answers are different then the answers to #6 (online it was basically the same question – the paper version had a much different #8 question). Members discussed the survey results briefly (some members were not present for the discussion at the last meeting).

Barbara presented six maps dealing with energy – solar, hydro, biomass, state recognized constraints (wetlands, wildlife habitat, rare and irreplaceable natural areas), current energy sources, and local constraints - conserved land, and land enrolled in the state's Current Use program. There were issues with some of the maps; the southern end of the Class 1 wetland was not included, the town's boundary was not correct, not all Current Use properties were included. Bob had prepared a new local constraints map, with those corrections. He will send it to RRPC. A local constraints map will be included in the new town plan, which will show where renewable energy will be discouraged (constrained) and where it is preferred. The regional energy map for Rutland County includes an overlay of areas within one mile of 3-phase power lines – there is only the slightest tip of one of those near the town line of Wallingford on West Hill Road.

Members scheduled a special meeting for Saturday, May 6, in order for members to review the current town plan to determine what else needs updating from a local standpoint – number of students in the school for instance. Barbara has edited information available at the RRPC level. She will be the official keeper of changes to the Town Plan – need to have it ready for public hearings beginning in July. Steve at RRPC will update the maps as part of the re-adoption process.

Barbara invited members to attend the wrap-up of the High Meadows grant regarding flood resiliency, which will take place in Pawlet on April 26th. The grant involved Tinmouth, Danby and Pawlet.

Next regular meeting was scheduled for May 18th, 2017.

Maple Oatmeal Pie

- 3 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 cups pure grade B maple syrup
- 3 tablespoons lightly salted butter, melted
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 2/3 cup unsweetened shredded coconut
- 2/3 cup quick-cooking rolled oats
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 9-inch unbaked piecrust

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. In a large bowl, beat eggs, maple syrup, melted butter and vanilla until well combined. Stir in coconut, oats and walnuts. Pour the mixture into piecrust. Bake the pie until golden brown, about 45 minutes.
