~ Town Meeting 2019 Last Reminder!! ~

Town Meeting is **Saturday**, **March 2nd** this year. Public questions and budgets will be voted from the floor at the Community Center, meeting starts at **1:00**. Officers will be chosen on **Tuesday**, **March 5th** via Australian balloting, 8:00 a.m. -7:00 p.m. or you may cast an early/absentee ballot for that election.

School Board Member to the Mill River Unified Union School District – 3 year term – in the only contested race **Carolyn Feury** and **Amy Martone** are running to replace retiring Grant Reynolds.

~ Registering to Vote ~

You do not have to register to vote before the election. Vermont has instituted **same-day voter registration**, meaning that if you have not previously registered to vote and want to do so on town meeting day, you can register then and there.

You do need to be a resident of the town in which you are registering to vote, and proof of that (like a utility bill).

~ Absentee Ballots ~

If you wish to request an Absentee Ballot, you must do so before 5:00 pm on Monday, March 4th. Voted ballots must be returned by 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 5th. You can also vote early at the town office.

~ Homestead Declaration ~

Easter Service

This a reminder that you need to file an **annual** Homestead Declaration with the Vermont Department of Taxes, form HS-122. You must file this to qualify for the homestead education tax rate and to request a property tax adjustment if you are eligible. You must also file form HI-144 (household income), **due April 15th**. This is required even if you do not have to file or pay state income taxes.

A current rabies certificate is required. You can call the Town Office if you don't know if your dog needs a shot or not. Fees are \$9 for neutered/spayed dogs and \$13 for those that are not. 50% penalty is assessed after April 1st.

~ Tinmouth Volunteer Fire Department News ~

A message from your local Fire Fighters - In the event of an emergency situation.

Firefighters NEED to be dispatched by 911! You are not "inconveniencing" anyone by going directly to 911. The dispatcher will assure proper backup for the firefighter and the local fire department.

So, Please do not call your neighborhood firefighter directly!

Here is the proper method should you have to report a fire:

- 1. Call 911.
- 2. If you get NO response, (which would mean statewide 911 dispatching is down) then call the Fire Station at 446-2460.
- 3. If statewide 911 should be down, and you cannot reach the Fire Station by phone, drive to the Fire Station, or get a neighbor to help get word there.

Remember our Fire Fighters are volunteers, and the Fire Station is not normally staffed.

Please call 911 if any of these situations should occur:

If your smoke alarm or CO2 alarm goes off, **call 911**. They will dispatch the Tinmouth Volunteer Fire Department to your house to check the problem out. The fire department has equipment to check CO2 levels in your house.

If you suspect a chimney fire, call 911 right away! Do not wait! Chimney fires can quickly become house fires. The TVFD has the equipment and experience to determine when the chimney fire is actually out.

To prevent chimney fires, you should clean your chimney in the Fall and also at least mid-winter. As we get to warmer Spring-like weather, stoves tend to build up more creosote, as the fire is not needed to burn as hot as in cold weather. This can lead to a higher chance of a chimney fire.



The Tinmouth Volunteer Fire Department is run by a dedicated group of Volunteers. Anyone interested in joining the department is welcomed!

Tinmouth has had a reputation for having an amazing group of Junior

Firefighters. If any young residents are interested, please show up to our monthly meeting, 7:00pm the first Thursday of the month. Or talk to one of the current Firefighters. We ask that Junior volunteers be at least 13 years old. Their roles are helping to support the Firefighters while not being in harm's way.

~ Unclaimed Property at the Vermont State Treasurer's Office ~

Just an annual reminder that a number of Tinmouth folks have unclaimed property being held at the State Treasurer's office. There is a process to get it back. Telephone, snail mail and Internet are ways to access and claim it. Visit <u>www.Vermont.gov</u> Treasurer's office for more information, or stop by the town office to find out if you are on the list and to pick up the forms.

Nearly 40 Tinmouth folks are named, some are now deceased, some have moved, but some at still here – values are less than \$10 to more than \$200. Could be a forgotten bank account, uncashed check, security deposit refund, etc. These items have to be turned over to the state treasurer by banks, insurance companies, and others.

Dear Friends,

As I write this column, our woodpile is getting pretty low. Gary is certain we have enough to make it through the rest of the cold weather, so I am looking at

CHURCH of the cold weather, so I am looking at our shrinking woodpile as a sign that winter is almost ready to give up. Sure, we might still be in for a chilly surprise or two, but essentially, the warmth and light are making their way back to us.

I appreciate that we can count on the seasons to change, and especially that we don't get stuck in any one season. (I have always been a fan of seasonal changes!) Whenever a scientist talks about the perfect distance of the earth from the sun, I can't help but think of this as a miracle. If we were closer, earth would be too hot, if we were further away, it would be too cold. If the axis were tilted differently, then the seasons as we know them would not happen. So many possibilities for the miracle to not happen, and yet, here we are with seasons.

The church year is also made up of seasons, and I find them to be helpful in terms of shaping a life of faith. Lent is just about to start as I write this, with Ash Wednesday on March 6th. Lent is a season of going within, of reflecting on one's faith. It is a relatively private season. Lent has roots in Jesus's 40-day sojourn in the wilderness where he dealt with hunger and temptations as well as wrestled with God's expectations of him and his own self-understanding.

Sometimes people give something up for Lent – like chocolate or wine, while at other times people choose to add some special practice of faith to their lives for the season. Each year I like to reflect on what I most need at that point in my faith journey, and then choose something to commit to that responds to this need. This makes Lent more personal, and in the bigger picture it makes my faith more vital as well.

When we bring larger issues of faith and other aspects of life into the personal realm, it makes an important connection between us and the world. It gives us a sense of contributing to the larger needs of the world in which we live, and helps us recognize that each of us has something positive and important to offer. We only need to take time to figure out what it is.

My hope for each of us in the Lenten season, as winter gives way to spring, is that we might each reflect on what it is we need (to give? to receive? to contemplate?) in order to offer our very best self in service to the larger community.

Super Crispy Ginger Snaps

2 cups flour 2tsp. Baking soda 1/2 tsp salt 1 tsp cinnamon 2 1/2 tsp ginger 1/2 tsp cloves 1 & half sticks unsalted butter 1 cup sugar 1 large egg 1/4 cup molasses Sugar for rolling

Cream sugar and butter until fluffy in mixer. Add egg then molasses, and beat until smooth, then scrape. Combine dry ingredients, then beat into mix. Finish mixing with strong spatula. Chill, then roll into balls, roll in granulated sugar and put on cookie sheets covered with parchment paper. They spread; give them room. Bake at 350 for 15 minutes with oven racks in bottom part of oven. Rotate trays halfway through. Cool on racks.

The event will feature a demonstration of early maple sugarmaking in a cast iron kettle over an open fire by Phillip Mahar. Local sugarmaker Ryan Mahar and historians David Wright and Jon Mathewson will give a presentation on maple sugaring history and current practice using examples from the Historical Society collection.

Homemade soup, chili and delicious maple desserts created by Historical Society members, Vermont maple products and new 2019 syrup will be available for sale. Old-fashioned sugar on snow, pancakes & syrup, and maple cotton candy are always favorites.

Acoustic music by Paul Morgan and friends and kids' activities enliven the free afternoon event. Videos about Vermont maple sugaring will be shown continuously.

Silent auction offers include Killington ski & golf passes; 100 gallons of heating oil; genealogical research; lessons and services by local professionals; a wine and cheese basket; a Cabot cheese basket; potted flowers; a homemade quilt as well as other fine craft items; homemade pies; maple syrup; a Vermont Teddy Bear; dining gift certificates and other donations from area businesses.

~Meeting Highlights~

Select Board ~ 2/14/19 Regular Meeting

Present were members Michael Fallar, Frank Sears, and Cathy Reynolds, as well as Eric Buffum – Road Commissioner, Chuck Bronk, Shelly Sears, Hollis Squier, Grant Reynolds, Jo Reynolds, Don Woods, Eng., Doug Fontein, and Gail Fallar – Select Board Assistant.

Highway – Eric advised there had been a problem with a frozen brake relay valve on the new truck, it had to be towed to Hoosick Falls for repairs. The towing company had trouble along the way, a chain broke and that resulted in flat spots on the tires – the towing company had advised they will pay for new tires. Truck was fixed and back in town before the big storm arrived.

Civil Engineering – Don Woods reviewed 17 questions with Board and those present regarding uses at the town garage, transfer station, location of various components, functionality, cost concerns, security, etc. Mr. Woods advised this will help him with the overall development of a site plan but it will not be ready for town meeting. Board discussed process of communications – Board can't email discussions among themselves without violating the Open Meeting Law. Board assistant will cc Board on all communications with Mr. Woods, Board members can respond directly only to her, not to each other. Everyone needs to be kept in the loop. If a decision needs to be made, Board will hold a special meeting.

Others ~ Hollis expressed concern about snow plowing near the dry hydrants – road crew used to keep them clean in case the fire department needed access. Eric will try to keep them plowed.

New Business – Residents of the Town of Shrewsbury have expressed concern with power outages and the lack of telephone service once the back-up batteries have run out of juice (there is no capability to call **911** for help). There have been a couple of pro-longed outages – several days – that have gone un-reported to the Public Service Department. Board asked Board Assistant to draft a letter of concern as well.

Town Meeting Preparation – Board will be prepared to answer questions regarding the highway budget, appointing versus electing constables, town garage and property tax increase.

Milfoil Grant Application – Gail requested Board approve an application from the Tinmouth Pond Milfoil Project for an aquatic nuisance grant from the Department of Environmental Conservation. Board voted in favor.

Old Business –

Solid Waste Ordinance – further amendment and review – postponed until March meeting.

Present were Board members Ann Czar (elected), and Grant Reynolds (school), as well as Gail Fallar.

Ann reported a couple of folks had expressed interest in the coordinator/building manager position. After brief discussion, Board voted to appoint Rainbow Squier as the new TCC Coordinator. Ann will contact Bess (outgoing) and Rainbow (incoming) for them to transition. Ann noted that Rainbow will need training (from Cathy Reynolds or Nancy Birdsall) regarding website data maintenance/posting.

Gail advised that refinishing the Community Center floor is now on Gary Marcy's radar, no date set yet.

Grant moved to adjourn (his last motion as he is soon to leave the Mill River Unified Union School District Board). Ann thanked him for his wise counsel and service.

Solid Waste Alliance Communities (*Tinmouth is a member*) Receive Grant

The Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) defines Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) as "common household products that exhibit the characteristics (toxic, corrosive, reactive, *explosive*, and *flammable/ignitable*) of hazardous waste. As a result, these products may be harmful to human health and/or the environment. Many of these products are very common and are usually purchased from local hardware, automotive, and grocery stores. These products are so common and easy to purchase, many people forget that these products can be extremely harmful to their health or the environment (http://dec.vermont.gov/waste-

management/solid/materials-mgmt/HHW).

The Solid Waste Alliance Communities (SWAC) has received a grant from the State of Vermont, Agency of Natural Resources, DEC to assist with Household Hazardous Waste collection events. The funds from this grant help to offset the cost of collection, removal, and proper disposal of items that would otherwise cause, air, ground, and water pollution if disposed of improperly.
