The Mill River Union High School National Honor Society is helping with this effort; they will be providing turkeys and all the fixings (having organized food drives in all the schools in the district and done fund raising to purchase turkeys). We will then add to those baskets with more food and other items.

Non-Perishable Food Items such as peanut butter, jelly/jam, applesauce, pineapple, oatmeal, cereal, flour, sugar, oil, soup, pasta, spaghetti sauce, juice, boxed cake mixes, stuffing, tuna fish, crackers, rice, mac and cheese, beans, vegetables, fruit, cookies, etc.

~ Winter Driving Tips ~

Vermont Emergency Management urges residents to travel with caution and appropriately for road conditions and offers some winter safety tips:

- Check road and weather conditions before leaving; visit www.511vt.com or call 511 for this information.
- Always allow yourself extra time to get to your destination.
- Make sure your vehicle is in good mechanical condition with snow tires and winter windshield wiper blades.
- Watch for and expect changing road conditions, black ice, blowing snow, high winds or whiteout conditions can appear when you least expect them to.
- The single most important rule is to drive at a speed that matches the prevailing visibility, traffic and road conditions. The posted speed limits are for dry, clear conditions only.
- Be sure to leave yourself plenty of extra room, extend the following distance from other vehicles ahead.

Chocolate Crinkle-top Cookies

2 cups Nestle Toll House semi-sweet chocolate morsels

1 ½ cups all-purpose flour

1 ½ teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

6 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened

1 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract

2 eggs

½ cup powdered sugar

Microwave/melt 1 cup morsels in medium bowl in microwave or saucepan – stirring until smooth.

Cool to room temperature.

Combine flour, baking powder and salt in bowl.

Beat granulated sugar, butter and vanilla in larger mixer bowl until crumbly. Beat in melted chocolate.

Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Gradually beat in flour mixture. Stir in remaining morsels. Cover, chill just until firm.

Shape dough into $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch balls, roll in powdered sugar. Place on ungreased baking sheet.

Bake in preheated oven 350 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes or until sides are set but centers are still slightly soft, Let stand for 2 minutes; remove to wire racks to cool. Makes about 3 dozen.

Rutland Regional Planning Commission to Assist State in Identifying Local Water Quality Projects

(Rutland, VT) - In an ongoing effort to identify and support the most vital water quality projects in the region, the Rutland Regional Planning Commission (RRPC) will assist the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation in collecting and cataloging data from area municipalities in the Rutland Region between now and August 2020.

As part of the Vermont Clean Water Act's goal of reducing phosphorous and other nutrients from getting into the region's waterways, the RRPC will help the state maintain the Watersheds Projects Database to update specific assessed projects. This database includes all VT DEC water quality projects, such as those identified by Tactical Basin Plans, road erosion inventories to support stormwater planning for municipal roads, river corridor studies, and Stormwater Master Plans. The RRPC's work will focus on potential projects within the Rutland Region section of the Otter Creek and the Lower Lake Champlain watersheds.

The project is funded by federal Clean Water Act funds administered by the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation.

The Rutland Regional Planning Commission is a quasi-governmental non-profit organization which encourages the coordinated development of the Rutland Region, advocates for the needs of its member towns, and strives to build a thriving regional economy while enhancing the area's quality of life.

Vermont's regional planning commissions have been key partners in water quality efforts with state agencies, watershed groups, conservation districts, and municipalities.

Meeting Highlights ~

(Complete minutes are available at the town office.)

Select Board ~ 11/7/19 ~ Special

Present were members Michael Fallar, Frank Sears, and Cathy Reynolds, as well as Jay White-Architect, Eric Buffum-Road Commissioner, Grant Reynolds, Jo Reynolds, Paul Morris, Doug Fontein, and Gail Fallar.

Town Garage ~ Jay presented an estimate for the construction of a new town garage of \$675,040. Members discussed details, site work included is only for digging the hole for the garage, no costs for legal fees or contract review, or for owner's insurance during construction. The estimate prepared by Russell Construction is based on Jay's drawing approved by the Board at its October 12th meeting, which includes meeting the 2019 Energy Code (not yet adopted by the state, but will be in effect when construction happens). There are no floor drains, no radiant floor heat, metal siding (upon review Board decided to switch to wood clapboards – cost is about the same, only consideration is maintenance – it will have to be painted) which can be decided later. Ceiling height of 20' will add about \$17,000 to cost – and is currently in the estimate.

Board discussed whether a "Community Build" would be possible, are there things volunteers can do – like when the Community Center was built in 2000? Someone would need to be responsible for organizing all of that – no decision.

Site Work ~ Craig Jewett, Otter Creek Engineering, will provide cost estimates for storm water site work, water and waste water facilities, etc. next week, preliminary estimate is \$100,000. Board discussed whether the road crew could/should do some of the site work, or keep working on the roads.

Salt and Sand Shed ~ Board reviewed estimates Eric received a year and a half ago, they need updating, as well as estimates for the asphalt floor and a foundation. Board requested estimates for building the salt shed first (adding the sand shed later), and for doing it all at once.

Bond Documents ~ Board reviewed documents provided by Paul Guilani, Esq., need a good estimate of the total costs before proceeding. The plan is to have the bond vote at town meeting in March of 2020.

Tinmouth Community Fund (TCF) ~ The TCF Board requested the Select Board pass a resolution in support their plan to create a separate fund for continuing education scholarships. Cathy explained the process, the need to separate the general community fund monies from the scholarship monies as the TCF Board is going to begin a Capital Campaign for the continuing ed scholarships. Both Boards need to approve and sign. Board voted to approve the Resolution to transfer \$180,613 plus current gains for the first three quarters of 2019 (monies held at the Vermont Community Foundation). Board voted to

authorize Cathy to sign the agreement on behalf of the Select Board.

There are two funds at VCF, one is endowed (only 5% can be spent each year) with a 9/30/19 balance of \$316,577.67 and one is a reserve fund which can be spent if needed – current balance of \$50,711.50.

Select Board ~ 11/14/19

Present were members Michael Fallar, Frank Sears, and Cathy Reynolds, as well as Leonard Morris, Paul Morris, Sherry Johnson, Kim Harbaugh, Eric Buffum – Road Commissioner, Michael Fannin-Emergency Management Director, Jo Reynolds, Grant Reynolds, Denise McGinley, Adam Guettel, and Gail Fallar.

Agenda was reviewed, re-arranged highway to the beginning and moved financials to the end.

Minutes – Board voted to approve minutes of 10/10/19 with correction to change *oldest* truck with Navistar engine and to remove (*Who determines that?*); and minutes of 11/7/19 with correction to add *current* to prorated gains in the second to last paragraph.

~ Highway ~

Ramsey Yoder/Denise McGinley Driveway Permit -Board voted to approve a driveway permit on North End Road with conditions as noted by Eric.

Eric advised all is good. Board discussed new time sheets, asked Eric for more work detail. Eric noted the new 550 is in the shop getting its body and plow frame attached. Wings are on big plow trucks, ready for snow. Cathy noted the mail carrier was thankful for the Tinmouth road crew, better than Wallingford's.

Process to sell old one ton ~ Nothing formal was adopted as a process. Board agreed to set a minimum bid of \$25,000, advertise on/in Front Porch Forum, the Rutland Herald, and Vermont News Guide, sealed bid required. Eric will write an ad for the Board to review at the December meeting.

Michael Fannin ~ As Emergency Management Director, he provided Board with a verbal report on the recent statewide emergency exercise (10/24/19). It was a worthwhile effort; he received training in dealing with state agencies; the town office needs a transfer switch for a generator for when the power is out (need to determine where the generator would go, who will move it from the fire house, etc. – Michael and Kim will work on this); and copies of the LEMP (Local Emergency Management Plan) need to be updated a bit and made available to all town officials responsible for action in an emergency. A formal report will be coming from the state in the near future

He also reported that the Rutland Regional Planning Commission is working on a **Mutual Aid Plan** for towns to assist each other in emergency situations – necessary if any FEMA money is involved and towns want to get reimbursed. The Fire Department has its own mutual aid

agreement with other fire departments in the county. Still in the draft stages.

Michael advised that he has appointed **Ray Pratt** to be the **Emergency Management Coordinator**.

Board discussed whether there is a need for a special fund to deal with emergency projects, no decision.

Adam Guettel ~ Adam advised that there are water rights to a spring(s) on his property that once went to the old creamery, but now are owned by the neighbor to the south. He would like to purchase them to clear any encumbrance on his property. He inquired whether the Town had any interest in the spring rights for the old creamery for a future use, and offered to have a legal agreement in that regards. No one was sure if the lines actually run to the old creamery or to the house. The house now has a drilled well and does not need the spring.

Draft FY 21 Highway Budget ~ Board briefly discussed preliminary budget.

Publics Works Facilities ~ Board discussed bond documents, still waiting for final cost estimates. Board set special meeting for Tuesday, December 17th to discuss and review. Eric will update salt/sand shed estimates.

~ Old Business -

- * Wallingford Town Line Waiting for update from town attorney.
- * Trash on Mountain View Road Frank noted he is still working on this.
- * East Road Right of Way The attorney advised pursuing a zoning violation rather than illegal use of the town's right of way. Board took under advisement.

~ New Business -

Rutland Regional Transportation Council – Grant offered to attend a meeting and get back to the Board.

Draft FY 21 General Budget-Board briefly discussed, will review for December meeting. Gail advised health insurance costs are increasing dramatically.

Board voted to enter **Executive Session** to discuss personnel issues – salary, wages and benefits. Cathy, Frank and Michael went into the Library at 8:15, exited at 8:35, no action taken.

Members Concerns ~

Will the total cost of the new town garage, salt/sand shed, etc., be \$1 million, and is that too much? There is \$350,000 currently in the special building fund, would need to bond for \$650,000. Should the bond be for 20 or 30 years? There is a need to take care of town infrastructure and the town's equipment.

Planning Commission ~ 11/21/19

Present were members Michael Fallar, Vito Macaluso, Kim Harbaugh, Grant Reynolds, Andy Gilmore, Larry Carabeau, and Rainbow Squier, as well as Barbara Noyes Pulling from the Rutland Regional Planning Commission, Alma Somers, Tom Schmelzenbach, Sherry Johnson, and Gail Fallar, Secretary.

Michael opened the Hearing for the Somers Subdivision. Everyone introduced themselves. Tom explained the maps (Exhibits A-E) and the plan to subdivide 240 acres into 126 acre and 115 acre parcels. There are two houses on lot # 1 (north), no structures on lot #2(south). As the parcels are so large, the State advised them they do not need a state subdivision permit. Members reviewed requirements for subdivisions, found the property is located in both Rural Residential and Conservation Districts, as well as some of it being in the Agricultural Overlay District. Minimum lot sizes are 5 and 25 acres respectively, minimum clearly has been met. Road frontage requirements are met. Need for a survey was discussed. Tom advised that there was a survey done in the 1960's of the entire parcel, he had prepared these maps using information provided on the state's website and state coordinates and requested a waiver to survey the entire parcel. He also noted that he is an engineer, but not a surveyor. The center line is very easy to see, and he included a metes and bounds description with the application. He advised he is aware of the 120 day requirement to file a Mylar of the survey. Members decided that only the center line between the north and south lot would be required for this application.

Members voted to approve the application as submitted, subject to the survey of the middle line and Mylar being filed. That hearing was closed.

Michael opened the Hearing for the Enhanced Energy Plan at 7:25. No public comments. Grant noted he had reread the document, it is just as full of things imposed by others and not correct, on the other hand . . . he turned to Vito, who advised that while it's not much of a choice, it's better than nothing . . . and then further noted that he still felt our really good Town Plan was being corrupted by this new energy section, not happy but would not stand in the way. Barbara again advised that the energy section could be updated as new information becomes available when the town plan is updated every few years. The state's Comprehensive Energy Plan is due for review in 2022, (every five years), so that may also provide a chance for updating as well.

Vito moved to approve and pass the Enhanced Energy Plan along to the Select Board for their action. Rainbow 2nded. Five members voted yes, one voted no, and one abstained. Motion passed. Hearing was closed at 7:35.

Larry expressed concern with the situation where the Gilmore farm cannot subdivide a 4 acre lot and felt it needed to be addressed. Members advised that a house could be built on the parcel as a whole (89 acres) and the four acres given a 99 or 999 year lease. A future planning commission might look at changing the minimum lot size (currently five acres), but it can't be done for one spot.

Next meeting was set for Thursday, January 16, 2020 – no Planning Commission meeting in December.

Energy Committee ~ 11/4/19

Present were members Todd Dennis and Ray Pratt, as well as Gail Fallar, temporary scribe

Todd advised he requested information from BROC and NeighborWorks twice – still waiting for a response. He wrote a case study of his own work on his house, savings achieved, etc. He will ask Cathy to add it to the website.

Gail advised that the Planning Commission's hearing for the Enhanced Energy Plan is on November 21st.

Gail asked if the Energy Committee would be willing to write short energy advice blurbs for the Tales of Tinmouth. Todd offered write them, Ray offered to research. She also inquired about what other towns' energy committees are doing.

Members discussed how to save energy – buildings are easy, transportation more difficult.

Members agreed to meeting quarterly, February, May, August and November – except they will meet on Monday, January 13th in order to discuss a possible Tinmouth Community Fund grant –February 1st deadline.

Solid Waste and Recycling Committee 11/13/19

With thanks to Helen Mango, Secretary

Present were members Wheaton Squier, Gail Fallar, Jonathan Czar, Chris Martone and Helen Mango.

Chris reported on solid waste and recycling costs in neighboring towns. Many towns operate similarly to Tinmouth, with variable pricing of garbage disposal and free recycling.

We need to specify that contractor bags and other bags larger than 30 gallons are two punches.

However, with recycling costs going up, we need to do something different. One possibility is to increase the cost of a transfer station ticket. This would need to go to the Select Board.

Motion was passed to advise the Select Board to increase the cost of a transfer station ticket to \$25 for ten punches, currently the cost is \$20.

Modifications to the location of the roll-offs have made work easier for the Transfer Station workers.

To encourage people to compost more, Chris will make signage more distinct and make the composting bins more visible.

Safety & Wellness Committee ~ 11/19/19

Present were members Frank Sears, Ray Pratt, Gail Fallar, and Ronnie Crossman via telephone

Committee reported no near misses. No concerns.

Gail reported on the recent statewide Emergency Response Exercise. Tinmouth was one of 23 towns that participated along with many state agencies. Michael Fannin, Emergency Management Director, was in charge, and spent nearly the entire day at the town office overseeing responses to possible emergencies following a "major flood event". A number of things were determined to need attention. The town office needs a transfer switch to connect a generator if there is a power failure. The newly adopted Local Emergency Management Plan needs a few additions for contacts and more copies available to those who would be in charge in a real emergency. The school needs to add call the fire department to set up a generator for the well when the power is out. The school has a generator, but the water is pumped from the fire house.

Frank reported he had difficulty getting responses regarding fire detection systems for the town office and fire house. He did leave messages for them to contact Gail – he advised Gail and Marshall Squier, Fire Chief should take the lead.

Members discussed "kill" switch pros and cons for town equipment. Insurance company recommends and they are covered by the safety grant program. Ronnie noted one of the big trucks had one that worked well in the beginning, but was worn out by the time the truck was traded. He noted most of the equipment has them, the big trucks do not.

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
