~ Winter Driving Tips ~

Vermont Emergency Management urges residents to travel with caution and appropriately for road conditions and offers some winter safety tips:

- Check road and weather conditions before leaving; visit www.511vt.com or call 511 for this information.
- Always allow yourself extra time to get to your destination.
- Make sure your vehicle is in good mechanical condition with snow tires and winter windshield wiper blades.
- Watch for and expect changing road conditions, black ice, blowing snow, high winds or whiteout conditions can appear when you least expect them to.
- The single most important rule is to drive at a speed that matches the prevailing visibility, traffic and road conditions. The posted speed limits are for dry, clear conditions only.
- Be sure to leave yourself plenty of extra room, increase the following distance from other vehicles ahead.

For road conditions call 511 or visit 511vt.com. For personal assistance, like heating help or other information, call 211.

To the Tinmouth Community,

Currently, Tinmouth students are learning in-person. They are catching up on academic work. They are also leading the way through difficult times. The divisiveness that marked the year 2020 peaked in November as closely called election results were challenged, protests continued nationwide, and a renewed onslaught of Covid cases appeared. The latter events forced Tinmouth Mountain School (TMS) into remote learning from March through to mid-October.

In spite of the dismal context, TMS opened in mid-October to in-person learning. This left remote learning as an option for parents who felt the benefits of in-person learning did not outweigh safety and health concerns. Children returned and were overjoyed at seeing friends, staff, and teachers. The enthusiasm is still apparent a month later. It is hard to argue with the research that advances in-person learning as socially grounded and necessary. Working collaboratively with peers in a classroom community is certainly more effective than remote on-line learning, especially in the elementary grades.

Our students' attitudes and simple acts of kindness are enlightening particularly during these divisive times. Just before the November presidential election, one young man assured his teacher that he still liked her even though he knew she wasn't voting for Trump because "educators just don't vote for him". I'm not sure how true that is but our young scholar reminded us of the importance of tolerance.

Additionally, students have been open to the restrictions mandated by the Center for Disease Control. Throughout the day, teachers bring students outside where they can socially distance and remove masks. Surprisingly, there is minimal to no interest in removing masks. Likewise, students work and eat with classmates in their homerooms. Recesses outside are in classroom pods as well. Students have taken these changes in stride. The children's resilience reminds us that we're in this together.

Everyone's life has been impacted by this year's events, which we have no control over. Resilience in the face of economic and political uncertainty includes looking for opportunities to nurture and cultivate community. In this holiday season of gratitude and peace, our students are continuing to grow in compassion as well as succeed academically. Their resilience, tolerance, and appreciation for community motivates us all to follow suit.

The Legislature also (for 2021) removed the requirement to get signatures for a petition. If you wish to run for office, you only need to file a consent form, available at the town office, with the town clerk 5:00 PM Monday, **January 25**th.

~ December is the Start of Bird Feeding Season ~

MONTPELIER, Vt. – The Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department recommends Vermonters wait to put up bird feeders until December 1 to avoid attracting bears.

Doug Morin, Vermont Fish and Wildlife's bird project leader said, "This may be a particularly good winter for attracting winter birds arriving from Canada, including Evening Grosbeaks and Common Redpolls. Black oil sunflower is a good seed choice that will attract a variety of birds, and folks may want to try other seeds or suet to attract certain species. Thistle, for example, attracts many of the finches. Gardeners will find leaving late-blooming flowers uncut provides seeds which can also attract birds."

While watching your bird feeders, you can participate in one or more bird monitoring projects by looking up the Audubon Christmas Bird Count, the Great Backyard Bird Count and Project Feeder Watch—all three collect important information to understanding bird populations.

The Fish and Wildlife Department offers these tips for bird-friendly bird feeding:

- Keep cats inside. Domestic cats are the leading cause of bird death in North America, and feeders can make birds particularly easy prey.
- Place feeders closer than 4 feet or farther than 10 feet from a window. Being close to, or far from a window reduces bird collisions.
- Clean feeders regularly. To eliminate harmful bacteria and viruses, feeders should be washed every few weeks with a 10 percent bleach solution, then rinsed and allowed to dry before refilling.
- Feed birds only between December 1 and April 1, but remove feeders if you see signs of bears. Most bears should be in dens during this time, but some delay entering their dens while even those that have denned may re-emerge to feed if there is a period of warm weather. Bears that learn to get food from people will continue to do so, potentially leading to property damage and dangerous encounters with people which can result in the bear's demise.

~ Meeting Highlights ~

Select Board ~ 11/12/20

Present were members Michael Fallar, Cathy Reynolds, and Frank Sears, as well as Steffanie Bourque – Rutland Regional Planning Commission (RRPC), Eric Buffum – Road Comm., Ronnie Crossman - Road Crew, Stan Wilbur – PW Project Manager, Sherry Johnson, Michael Fannin – EMD, Hollis Squier, Asha Carroll, *Planning Commission Members* Vito Macaluso, Grant Reynolds, and Kim Harbaugh; and Gail Fallar – Sel. Bd Asst.(SBA) Local Hazard Mitigation Plan ~

Steffanie introduced herself and explained the work of the LHMP Planning Committee to date, noting that this was an invitation for comments from the Select Board. Planning Commission and public. Members of the committee are Eric Buffum, Frank Sears, Michael Fannin, Ray Pratt, Hollis Squier and Gail Fallar, representing the road crew, select board, emergency management, fire department and the Town Office respectively. She noted this is a plan to work on mitigating natural hazards that may occur (severe storms for example) to reduce risk of damage. This plan updates the 2015 LHMP and requires approval from the Select Board and FEMA. The sections presented outline the current status of the town; the next step is to address what needs to be done, and will be presented in a month or two. She noted is only a plan to help the town. Frank thanked her and the committee for their efforts. As there were no questions or comments at this time, she asked for them to be emailed to her. The plan will be posted on the town's website with links posted on Front Porch Forum and in Tales of Tinmouth. Stormwater Management Plan ~

Steffanie also addressed this document. A copy had been provided to the Select Board along with a copy of the state's municipal roads general permit/storm water regulations. She has been working with Eric to determine which road segments (100 meters or 328 feet) are hydrologically connected to state waters and need to meet the storm water rules. RRPC conducted a road and culvert inventory over the summer and that information has been incorporated into the plan. There are 246 segments. Currently 55% of roads fully meet the requirements. The plan includes maps showing the location of the segments and which need work. Only two roads (Merrill Spring and Upper Gulf) have high priority segments that need to be addressed by 2025, other work has to be done by 2035.

Road standards include crown, berm, drainage, conveyance, culverts, erosion factors, etc. There is an implementation table that will need to be filled in, to schedule work to be done. Eric and the Board will need to work on this at a later date. In the end, it is hoped that the plan and inventory will lead to the development of a budget and schedule to upgrade and track all work as it has to be reported annually. Steffanie noted the RRPC will help along the way. Frank again thanked Steffanie for her efforts on the town's behalf.

It was noted that the state has several grants programs to help towns with this work, Grant-In-Aide, Better Roads grants, VTrans grants. The town will need to use strategic thinking to match the work with funding sources and time them appropriately.

Highway ~

Eric reported the road crew is busy with spot grading, has plowed snow once, is in good shape for winter. Both big trucks recently had repair work done.

New Tandem Truck ~ Board discussed warranty proposals from DeLurey Sales, approved the stainless steel oil pan and the addition of an airbag for the wing (was omitted from the original specs) but is needed to keep the wing and truck balanced while in use. Board briefly discussed standard vs automatic transmission – standard would cost about \$10,000 less. Eric noted that most drivers are now used to driving automatics and if Ronnie was unavailable, he would need to train someone to drive it. He also advised that Ronnie was only going to be working for the town for another five years and the truck would not be replaced for seven. Board voted to purchase the 2021 truck with the stainless steel oil pan, the added air bag, the automatic transmission, and the 5 year warranty package for a total of \$150, 064.

Winter Salt – SBA prepared a chart of salt prices received from three salt vendors. Board noted that they had asked for winter salt to go out to bid, and instructed the SBA to make it so for its meeting December 10th.

Better Roads Grant ~ SBA suggested applying for the grant to fix the culvert on Potter's Brook on North End Road. Eric noted he preferred to use it for ditching work on North East Road between the Patry's and former hunting preserve. Board by consensus agreed with Eric, asked to have application ready for review for their 12/10 meeting. Grant is due on 12/18.

Snow and Ice Workshop ~ Cathy reported she had attended two webinars recently dealing with snow and ice, she learned at lot, and was happy to report that everything recommended is practiced by Eric. Gravel roads need a special type of plow blade that is expensive but lasts a long time. She asked Eric about it, he will research.

Covid 19 ~ Michael Fannin, EMD, noted the virus is spiking, 75% is due to social gatherings/parties. He again expressed concern with food shortages, possible school closings, etc.

Public Works Facilities ~

Stan advised he has arranged for the Board to speak with Craig Jewett from Otter Creek Engineering on the 24th. He will send along a proposal from them that will

include all site work except clearing and stumping, in order to be ready to build in the spring.

Financials ~

Financial Report ~ Gail advised that the state had decided to not fund the VTrans grant programs this year, and instead sent each town additional highway aide. In Tinmouth's case that is \$21,936. Board requested that it be added to the revenue and expenditure budgets while they decide how it should be used. Board voted to approve as presented, with the condition to add the extra highway aide in new lines.

Warrants ~ Payroll Warrants #18 dated 10/31/20 for \$3,344.98 and #19 dated 11/9/20 for \$1,409.92 were approved.

FY22 Budget ~ Board asked for first draft for its 12/10/20 meeting.

Old Business ~

Trash and Dogs at 605Mountain View – SBA is contacting attorney.

72 Snow Mountain Lane – No change.

12 Ezra Stone Road – Frank advised he had reinspected, all work was done and he authorized residential use again.

New Business ~

Constable Duties ~ After brief discussion, Board decided to move this off the agenda until January.

Personnel Policy ~ Cathy noted that the Board needed to discuss a plan for leave time, including whether it was due to covid19 and if substitutes were needed. She advised that the PP should be amended to require Select Board approval for all leave time. Also needed is a "What If" plan to cover snow plowing routes, how to meet staffing needs if someone is sick or injured, who will run the show, etc. Should also include the Town Office to make sure payroll and bills are paid on time. Perhaps a list needs to be started of possible drivers with CDL's. Also need to let the public know that if a situation occurs, they need to be patient waiting for roads to be plowed, etc.

Board discussed various options, asked Eric and Gail to present something on the 10th. Eric requested direct deposit for the road crew. Cathy asked Gail to write down the processes for how the Town Office functions, also suggested using Front Porch Forum or *Tales* to ask if there is anyone with a CDL willing to help in an emergency.

Health Insurance ~ Up for renewal in December, road crew is happy with what they have, Board requested information about MVP and BCBS rates.

New Town Office Assistant ~ Gail advised that she had hired her granddaughter Josie Cone to help out temporarily in the town office.

Select Board ~ 11/24/20

Present were members Michael Fallar, Frank Sears, and Cathy Reynolds, as well as Eric Buffum – Road Commissioner, Stan Wilbur – Public Works Project Manager, Hollis Squier, Sherry Johnson, Kim Harbaugh, Craig Jewett – Engineer with Otter Creek Engineering (OCE), Grant Reynolds, and Gail Fallar – (SBA).

Public Works Facilities ~

Craig reviewed OCE's proposal, noting it was for the construction phase that included grading, rough earthwork, removal of excess material (non-impervious scope) and would provide administration and review of the bid phase including advertising and would be done before town meeting day.

Stan advised that it was not for storm water treatment. Craig acknowledged that the lack of state approval for the storm water permit relating to the building construction was his responsibility and hoped to have the information requested by the state to them by the end of the year. He did note that the construction permit for the earthwork (erosion control) had been approved. The operational permit is still under review.

Craig inquired whether the Board wanted to build in phases, and whether the garage or salt/sand shed would be first. Board acknowledged there may not be enough money to do both at this point in time, that the garage should probably come first.

Craig then advised that if only the garage was built for now, there was a good chance that the total impervious surface would be less than one acre and therefore the storm water permit would not be needed. The retention pond could be constructed later if it was still needed. Annual fees, inspections and reporting would also not be required.

And given that the area around the salt/sand shed may need to be increased, that may change the permit requirements as well. There are also questions about the salt/sand shed's location (not the best), should it be rotated or moved, consider a pole barn style, and earthwork cost (2/3 of site work cost is related to the salt/sand shed) needs to be pondered.

Board discussed at length how to proceed, how/whether to determine total costs to help decision process relating to which to build first, the need to get something moving, whether to go back to voters for more money (the \$850,000 bond vote was the total cost – that clearly is not enough at this point, but the Board has advised voters they would only borrow \$375,000 or so), whether to move the transfer station operation, whether to move the salt/sand shed location, how to keep transfer station and highway department separate, whether to hire a contractor for a design-build for the garage, etc.

Craig also advised that delaying the salt/sand shed might provide time to work on grant opportunities. There

is state money available for salt sheds, but not sand sheds or town garages. Pittsford and Vergennes are currently building salt sheds with grant funding.

More storage is needed for winter salt, state is not concerned about sand as there is not much salt added to it, and it is not a pollutant.

Board asked Eric for his opinion, he advised putting the town garage first is good, but is not sure that design/build will result in any cost savings.

Stan advised he can prepare request for qualification for design builders. He asked if the Board wanted to have a separate contractor for site work and design build. Board asked Eric if the road crew could handle the site work for the town garage – removing trees, moving the fill, excavation, etc. Eric replied yes, just not right now. Stan noted the Conservation Commission would like some fill on the southern part of the lot to help create some level areas for recreation.

Board asked Craig to hold off on the storm water permit – he will check to make sure there is less than an acre of impervious surface under consideration; talk to the state about withdrawing the application; and get clarification in writing from the state. He will follow up with Stan before the 10^{th} .

Stan will prepare draft request for qualifications for their meeting on the 10^{th} . He advised that the best contractor may not be the lowest bidder.

Board thanked Craig for his suggestions this evening.

Highway ~

Eric reported no big changes, getting ready for winter, wings are now on the trucks.

Harrington Cross Road – road closed signs keep blowing away, need better blockage and signage, may add sand to the barrels to keep them in place.

Channel Road – Hollis reported that he has spoken with the sub-contractor, who stated that the work will be done next week. Board thanked Hollis for his continued work on this issue.

Better Roads Grant - Gail and Eric explained that there was confusion at the last SB meeting concerning grants. Eric was thinking about the Grant-In-Aide and Gail was speaking about the Better Roads Grants. After brief discussion, Board agreed by consensus to apply for both, GIA for ditching on North East Road and BRG for the culvert on North End Road.

Financial ~

Warrants Reviewed ~ Payroll Warrant #20 dated 11/16/20 for \$2,551.53 and Accounts Payable Warrant #8 dated 11/13/20 for \$26,275.92 were approved.

Truck Voucher Update ~ Gail advised that the claim had been denied, Board granted permission to appeal.

Old Business ~

72 Snow Mountain Lane - No report

Trash and Dogs at 605Mountain View – Gail advised Attorney Jim Carroll is working on it.

New Business ~

Letter from Tim and Kelly Smith - Board reviewed the Smith's request for tax relief as they felt it necessary to send their daughter to Christ the King School for her education. Board denied the request as they have no authority regarding the matter and referred it to the school district.

Personnel Policy and What If Plans – Proposed PP amendments had been previously sent, but were not included in the Board packet for this meeting. Cathy noted the Town also needs to be prepared for "what if" regarding employees and Covid19. Board will work on both issues on the 10th.

Planning Commission ~ 11/19/20

Members present: Michael Fallar, Vito Macaluso, Pat Psholka, Kim Harbaugh, Bob Lloyd, Rainbow Squier, and Grant Reynolds, as well as Kim Young, Howard and Debbie Buffum, Joe Buffum, Sherry Johnson, and Gail Fallar, Secretary.

Minutes of 3/12/20 were approved as written, Rainbow moved, Bob 2nded, all voted in favor. There were no meetings in the interim as non-essential meetings were cancelled due to the pandemic.

Preliminary Subdivision meetings

Kim Young explained her proposed two lot subdivision. There will be a 5 acre lot created with the existing mobile home and equipment shed along West Hill Road and a 16 acre parcel with the existing log home located east of the first lot. There will be a deeded right of way for the house through the 5 acre lot, and a shared well. Each dwelling has existing in-ground septic systems. After brief discussion, members voted to give preliminary approval to move forward with the project.

Howard and Deb Buffum explained their proposal. They wish to create a five acre lot with the existing mobile home on Snow Mountain Lane. It is complicated as some of the property is located in the Rural Residential District – 5 acre minimum lot size and the remainder is in the Conservation District – 25 acre minimum lot size. Total parcel size is currently 61.7 acres. Howard advised that the 2012 Snow survey by Mark Courcelle showed the approximate location of the zoning boundary and they felt they could create a 5 acre lot all in the RR district. They would prefer to keep the existing sugar house and pole barn on the remaining 56 acres. After brief discussion, members voted to give them preliminary approval to move forward and have it surveyed.

Village Center Designation Update – Grant and Pat advised they have not had an opportunity to visit the Town Office (due to the pandemic) to garner what is

already on the town computer regarding this project – that's where it was left at the last meeting in March. Bob offered to help as much as he could, and advised that the Rutland Regional Planning Commission was ready and willing as well. Pat offered to gather the information at the Town Office, scan it and send to all PC members. Grant advised he has trouble with the GotoMeeting application, Sherry offered to host a sub-committee meeting with her Zoom account. Grant, Pat and Bob will work on getting the data organized and determine what still needs to be done.

Next meeting will be at the call of the Chair – when formal applications are received.

Conservation Commission ~ 11/16/20

Present online were members Doug Fontein, Ed Hasenohr, Nelson Jaquay, Robbie Leeds, Rainbow Squier, Jeff Ams and Chuck Bronk, as well as Maureen Fitzgerald-Riker and Doug Inkley.

New Business:

Doug Fontein introduced Maureen Fitzgerald-Riker, Principal of the Tinmouth Mountain School, and asked her to describe the Proposed Literature Trail on the Tinmouth Mountain Ridge Trail. Maureen described this project for the 4th, 5th, and 6th grade class, to install and support a Literature Trail consisting of 16-24 stations on the lower portion of the Trail. The concept is that it would be possible to walk up the trail and back, and read a page of an illustrated book at each station. Each station would consist of a lectern height cedar post with a Plexiglas protected sleeve to allow the placement of two laminated book pages. Maureen reported that she has discussed this proposal with the landowner, Adam Guettel, and that he She brings this to the Conservation approves. Commission for approval, as stewards of the Trail. Ed Hasenohr commented that some sections of the trail may not have sufficient soil to allow the support of a post and wondered if another means of station construction might be possible. Doug F. suggested that it might be possible to use a tree to brace the station. Nelson Jaquay pointed out that if the lower grades are a portion of the proposed audience of readers, the stations should not go too far up the Trail. Maureen responded that the portion of the Trail below the meadow was intended. She also suggested that Commission members visit the Stone Meadow in Wallingford where there is an existing Literature Trail. A motion to accept this proposal, passed unanimously. Maureen thanked the Commission and said that the plan was to proceed in the spring.

Rainbow Squier circulated to Commission members a draft planning document to describe to the Select Board the intentions of the Commission to utilize the Town property south of the Transfer Station for recreation/conservation. A number of minor edits were suggested and Nelson agreed to forward an edited version to Rainbow. It was agreed that this document should be sent to the Select Board over Doug's signature.

Doug F. posed the question to the Commission, do we need to take any action in light of the recent surge in COVID cases in VT? The consensus of the Commission was that we would await direction from the Select Board, since they directed us to re-open the Tinmouth Mountain Cabin.

Old Business:

Regarding the Drachman Trail, Doug F. reported that he and Ed had blazed the loop trail in both directions and finalized a map of the trail, which could be mounted at the signpost at the trailhead. Chuck agreed to laminate the map. Left over butt ends from logging activity, might be used to delineate parking areas at the trail head but the area is sufficiently wet at certain times of the year, that there would be a good chance of getting a car stuck in the mud. Doug F. and Ed suggested that getting a couple of loads of gravel might improve conditions for three or four parking spaces. Chuck raised the question of how we might publicize the availability of the Trail, now that it is cleared and blazed, and was reminded by Nelson that the Drachmans' intention was that this trail only be used by Town residents. It was suggested that an announcement might go in the Tales of Tinmouth with the Drachmans' approval.

Doug F. reported that the Switchbacks needed on the steeper sections of the Ridge Trail leading up to the saddle, are still on our "to do" list. Cutting and blazing the trail north from the Tinmouth Mountain Cabin, was tabled till spring as it will take two or more people and an institutional knowledge of the various easements involved.

Doug F. inquired if any Commission members had visited the Tinmouth Mountain Cabin lately, and none had. He agreed to check out the Cabin and either handle or report to the Commission, any maintenance items required.

Tinmouth Community Fund ~ 11/18/20

Present were members Jan Krantz (Chair), Cathy Reynolds (Treasurer), Casey Voigtlaender, Todd Dennis, Nikki Pfeiffer, Asha Carroll, Lisa Patry and Helen Mango (Secretary), as well as Gail Fallar.

Jan welcomed Lisa to the TCF Board.

Jan gave a brief outline of the committee's calendar: The TCF Board meets in June, November, and twice in February/early March (the first of these two meetings is to review the community grant proposals, and the second coincides with Town Meeting Day and is the TCF Board's annual meeting).

Jan reviewed the December donations appeal letter. Except for the K-12 camp scholarships, the letter lists everything that the TCF has accomplished this year, including a summary of which community projects received funding. It shows how much the TCF gives back to the community. Gail suggested adding the K-12 scholarship information, and making the letter two pages long to make it easier to read. Jan and Asha agreed to work up a section on the new small business grants. Jan and Gail will work on a second draft of the letter. The letter will need to be assembled by the end of November in order to go out in the December Tales of Tinmouth. Usually the envelope labeling and letter stapling is a group effort, but due to Covid restrictions the board decided to make stacks of letters and envelopes available to individual board members to work on at home and then bring the finished materials back to the Town Office. Nikki, Casey, Helen, Lisa, Cathy, Asha and Jan all offered to take a stack. Jan will coordinate with Gail and will email board members when the materials are available.

Jan and Asha brainstormed a new draft of the "small business start-up" application. Cathy suggested requesting more information from applicants in order to make funding decisions easier. Discussion followed about whether the grants should be limited just to new start-ups, or whether existing small businesses could request funding to expand their businesses. The board agreed to add "expansion" to the title of the grant. Asha discussed ways to include how the applicant's business will benefit the Tinmouth community. Jan will work on the new draft of the application and will send it to Asha for review. The application needs to get on the town website in December.

The board agreed that all application forms for all TCF grants need to have the same contact information (this has become inconsistent over the past few years). Todd offered to update the website to include the aligned contact information, clarify application due dates (which vary), and tidy up any other inconsistencies.

Jan added the idea of requesting that people who receive Community Grants take pictures of their funded projects to include in their end-of-year reports.

Under Other Business, Cathy gave a report on proceeds from the 2020 Plant Sale. Due to Covid, the traditional one-day, two-hour Plant Sale was replaced with a three-week, self-serve Plant Sale hosted by the Squier Family Farm Stand. It turned out to be a great success, netting a larger income (\$8300), allowing shoppers to spread out their purchasing, and making the work of the diggers/potters much less stressful and tiring. An abbreviated fall version of the Plant Sale netted an additional \$1000.

The board agreed that the February meetings would in all likelihood be remote meetings. The board will review Community Grant and Small Business StartUp/Expansion applications at the mid-February meeting. The Annual meeting will be on February 27.

~ Local Hazard Mitigation Planning Update ~

Steffanie Bourque, from the Rutland Reginal Planning Commission, and the LHMP Planning Committee, (Eric Buffum, Frank Sears, Michael Fannin, Ray Pratt, Hollis Squier and Gail Fallar), representing the road crew, select board, emergency management, fire department and the town office respectively, presented work done to date on the LHMP to the Select Board and Planning Commission on November 24th. Steffanie noted this is a plan to work on mitigating natural hazards that may occur (severe storms for example) to reduce risk of damage. This plan updates the 2015 LHMP and requires approval from the Select Board and FEMA. The sections presented outline the current status of the town; the next step is to address what needs to be done, and will be presented in a month or two. She noted is only a plan to help the town.







MONTPELIER, Vt. – The Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department released a new mobile application to help the public recreate outdoors in a safe and socially distanced manner. The "Vermont Outdoors" app connects the public with department lands, fish and wildlife regulations and up-to-date COVID-19 guidance.

"We've seen an increase in outdoor recreation across our 100 wildlife management areas and nearly 200 fishing access areas since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic," said Lands and Facilities Administrator Mike Wichrowski.
