As you know, the federal government has given the Town of Tinmouth \$177,000, in one-time money (due to the Covid pandemic) to be used to help the town with "long-term recovery."

A committee of seven people (Gregg Casey, Martha Stanley, Theresa Butts, Chuck Bronk, Michael Fallar, Sherry Johnson, and Holly Ross) has been appointed by the Select Board to research ideas and offer suggestions on how to use the money. This work is being done this summer, with the target date of September 1, 2022 to give the Select Board their suggestions. All meetings are open to the public.

The next meeting will be held at the town office (and available by Zoom) on **Monday**, **July 11 at 7 p.m.**

~ State Primary and Special Election August 9th ~

The Vermont State Primaries will be held on Tuesday, August 9th. This is where major parties choose their candidates for the November General Election.

The Select Board has also warned a special vote on proposed amendments to the Town's Zoning Regulation's **Attachment A – Flood Hazard Area Regulations**. The amendments simply update the Exempt Activities and Non-Conforming Uses and Variances Sections, and are required to enable the town to apply to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program.

Absentee Voting ~ Ballots for both of these elections are now available, you can request an absentee ballot by calling the town office at 802-446-2498 or emailing tinmouthtown@vermontel.net; you can stop by the town office to vote early; or you can cast your ballot on August 9th at the Community Center.

~ Tinmouth Day Activities ~

Games, activities, and a whole lot of **FUN** will be had on Saturday afternoon, July 9th in Tinmouth!! All ages, abilities, and genders are welcome at each event. Some games and activities will include getting wet, so a change of clothes (or several) and a towel is encouraged. There will be *prizes* at each station during the field games. Below you will find a description of each game / activity that will take place sometime during the day. Plan to join us!

FIELD GAMES

Whipped Cream Surprise Station

Stick your face in whipped cream, find the gum buried inside, and be the first to blow a bubble.

Balloon Stomp Station

A balloon is tied to each person's ankle with ribbon. The object of the game is to pop the other players' balloons, without using hands. Feet only. Last one standing is the winner. (Modification: create teams by issuing balloons of the same color)

Shoe Flip Station

This is a relay style race where the object of the game is to work as a team and flip a shoe over the endline. Divide the group into three teams. Each team starts behind a cone. Everyone should either be barefoot or have one shoe off. On the start signal, the first person puts on the shoe and flips it as far as they can. The next person runs out to their shoe, slips it on their foot and flips it farther. Each team continues until someone flips it over the endline (must go over the rope).

Drip Drip Drench Station

A duck duck goose style game but instead of touching the head and saying duck duck goose, *it* fills up a cup with water and <u>drips</u> a little bit on the heads (duck) and dumps the whole cup, <u>drench</u>, on the person they want to chase them (goose). *It* runs around the circle while the drench tries to catch them. The goal is to tap that person before they are able to sit down in the drench spot. Drench becomes the new "*it*". If *it* gets tagged, they sit in the middle. Continue to play until time is up.

Water Balloon Toss Station

Players line up in pairs facing each other. Each player holding a water balloon gently tosses it to their partner. If the other player catches it successfully, the partners both take a step backwards. If the balloon breaks, it's game over and that pair is out.

Donuts on a String

Donuts will be tied to strings of various heights. Each person chooses a donut that is of a comfortable height and stands behind it. All players must keep their hands behind their backs and, at the signal, eat their donut.

Disc Golf

Disc Golf is a game in which players attempt to throw a disc golf disc to a target or basket. The object is to complete each hole in the fewest number of throws, starting from a tee area and finishing with the disc coming to rest in the basket. Generally, a course is made up of 9 or 18 holes. The player with the lowest total cumulative throws wins.

Cornhole Tournament

A lawn game in which players / teams take turns tossing bean bags at a slanted platform. To play, each player throws their bag at the board opposite of them. When a player gets a bean bag in the hole, they score three points. Any bags that land (and remain) on the board, receive one point. Play continues until the first player or team reaches 21 points.

Fireman's Water Polo

Two teams face off each armed with a firehose (pressurized with water). At the signal, a ball is thrown into the "center" of the area. The teams work together to use the force of water from their firehose to move the ball past their opponents', earning them a point. Teams reform and another round begins. A game of strategy, good aim, and willingness to get wet! Mixed aged teams of all abilities will be formed to allow for kids to join in and help manage the hose.

Softball / Smushball Game

A fun game of softball will be played between two teams. The object of the game is to hit the ball (a regular softball or 16-inch ball will be used) with a bat and run around the bases before the opposing team attempts to either catch the ball or throw you out. Teams will be divided up at the start. If desirable, bring your own glove!

Dunking Booth

A large tank of water, over which a dunk seat is suspended, which can be made to tip or fall. The game is played by a ball being thrown at a target attached to the tank, which, if hit, will cause the seat to collapse, "dunking" the person into the water.

Children's Activities & Tie Dying

There will be a table set up of various children's activities - crafting, drawing, building, etc. - in the Community Center for all to enjoy.

Come and make a colorful piece of wearable art! Fun for all ages and abilities. We will have lots of bandanas and a random assortment of clothing items to choose from. Feel free to bring a blank item from home.

Uncle Roland was, of course, born and raised in Tinmouth in the house we just left. He was a member of the Tinmouth church and never removed his membership from there even though he lived in Chittenden County for all of his working and retirement life. Some years ago, he donated the pulpit Bible to the Tinmouth church in honor of his mother, Edna Elethorpe Wilbur, who was the organist in the old church. He was also a generous donor to the church and to the Anne and Roy Wilbur Fund.

Those of us who knew Uncle Roland loved to listen to his recounting of growing up in Tinmouth. A few years ago, he was the speaker at the event celebrating the initiation of the restoration of The Old Creamery—the business that brought the Wilburs to Tinmouth in the early 1900s. He was a most engaging person with whom to converse. And, you could count yourself among the truly honored if you received one of his vigorous hugs!

~ West Tinmouth School Memories ~

An anonymous reader, who grew up in West Tinmouth and went to school there, would like to share a few memories. The West Tinmouth School was closed in 1950, along with other one room schools in town, when all students were required to attend the Center School. An addition was added to make that one a two-room school. Check out the different slates on the roof!

Walking to School ~ This was a special time of day, walking along our dirt road in snow, mud or rain, required paying attention so not to get to school all mud or in wet clothes.

There were lots of things to look at along the way, spring flowers, trees with all stages of leaves and the sky filled with many different clouds.

Our school was moved down the road a short distance in early 1900's. Wondered where it was before, now many years later, found the answer – an old foundation.

Recess ~ The time of fun and games, swings, teeter-totter, softball and snowball contests. However, one side of the playground bordered a farmer's pasture with lots of bushes, cattle, and places to explore, play hide and seek, and follow the cows around.

We had a special place to get through the fence. The teacher never saw us disappear, only when the bell rang, it took longer to get back.

Fetching Water ~ Like some one room houses, we had no running water, so getting drinking water meant walking to the neighborhood farm house a short walk away. This was called a chore, but whoever had the assignment considered it a special duty because the farm house had a big friendly kitchen, where we were treated to fresh baked cookies and stories were shared with us. We felt this should be called educational as we learned about the history of the farm and family.

School Bell ~ There was the bell on the roof of the school, rang by pulling a rope at the back of the classroom. This bell was very loud, could be heard a long way.

Our eighth-grade teacher had a special hand bell. This bell was kept in a corner cupboard . . . strange mystery, the bell would disappear. She would look for days, then one day when she opened the cupboard, there it was. She never knew where it had been hiding!

~ Nature Notes ~

Bears, bears and more bears. Please be on the lookout, they have been seen all over town. One Mama has 3 cubs, another has 2, one huge fellow was videoed in the back yard dismantling a bird feeder.

If you walk or hike, one suggestion is to **carry an air horn** – it makes lots of noise!

~ Meeting Highlights ~

As the Select Board asked that their minutes only provide the minimum required, everyone is encouraged to attend their meetings either in person or via zoom for full details.

Select Board $\sim 6/9/2022$

Members present(in-person): Kevin Eaton, Cathy Reynolds, and Meadow Squier

Others present: Via Zoom: Sherry Johnson, Kim Harbaugh, Pat Psholka, Nancy Birdsall, and Rick Fallar:

In-person: Hollis Squier and Gail Fallar-SB Assistant, Michael Fallar at 8:38.

Board reviewed the agenda, added town day bonfire, ARPA guidelines, driveway permit process, and Better Places grant.

Public Works Facilities Update ~ Gail reported that Jerry Parker, of Parker Water Wells, had discounted some of the increase in the bill for the well – due to lack of water and the need to frac it, which increased gallons per minute from ½ to 1. Board expressed appreciation to Parker Water Wells.

Board discussed State Fire Safety Permit, Stan will send the application, with cover letter that mechanicals will be provided once they are received from Rick Smyrski at Morton Buildings. Still waiting . . After discussion, Board granted permission to Cathy to meet with Eric regarding electrical and lighting (down facing, motion sensors, timers, etc.). Kevin reported that there was a meeting this morning with Eric, GMP and Morton about the exterior electrical — apparently there is a new requirement for a new 'box', which is unavailable (8 month wait time). Later in the meeting, Board talked with Glenn Merrill who advised there was no decision made, a waiver might be granted.

Town Garage Colors: After discussion and consultation with David and Carleen Eaton, Board voted that the body of the building would be cream/ivory and the roof would be evergreen.

Meeting with the Eatons: Board set a meeting with David and Carleen at 6:00, prior to the Select Board meeting on July 14th to discuss concerns with operations/lights.

Morton Buildings: Still waiting for Rick Smyrski to provide plumbing and heating mechanicals.

Highway ~ Eric was on vacation, not present.

TAP Grant Report: Cathy noted there is no word from the state yet.

Back Hoe Bids: Board opened the two bids received – Glenn Merrill bid \$1,018; Hollis Squier bid \$1,027. Board voted to accept the high bid.

G.I.A. Grant Letter of Intent: Board voted to approve and sign Letter of Intent to participate in the State's

Grant-In-Aid program regarding stormwater projects for FY23. Estimated at \$11,000 this year.

Old Garage Repair: Moved to July 14th meeting. Board discussed painting versus re-siding, need estimates for both options.

Drive Way Permit Process: Cathy wrote a draft, Board will consider on July 14th.

Ash Tree Removal: No David Birdsall, moved to July 14th.

Old Business ~

Follow-Up To-Do List ~ Board discussed repairs to the handicap rails on ramp to library and the old fire house, and painting the town office.

Heat Pump Grants: May be available – need to obtain a quote to ready – Board authorized Cathy to gather more information – also mentioned update for town garage.

Financial ~

Board voted to approve warrants and financial report as presented.

New Business ~

ARPA Guidelines: Cathy reviewed draft she wrote earlier today, to help the committee develop projects for the SB to consider, included a time line and process, justification for the request, on-going cost to town, etc. Board reviewed list of proposals from town meeting, reduced it to five for the committee to review: fire department; pickle ball/tennis court; ash tree removal; recreation on town lot; the old creamery.

Board voted to authorize the town clerk to purchase air purifiers for the old fire house and town office by June 30. **ARPA Committee:** Seven people volunteered to serve – Theresa Butts, Chuck Bronk, Gregg Casey, Michael Fallar, Sherry Johnson, Holly Ross, and Martha Stanley. Board discussed size of committee and duties. Board voted to create an ARPA Committee with 7 members, and appointed all those who volunteered. The Committee is charged with reviewing the five projects agreed to above, and can add others if they are justified. Cathy will edit her guidance and include report back by 9/1/22 requirement.

Conservation Commission Vacancy: Board appointed Colleen Balch to fill vacancy created by Nelson Jaquay's resignation. Term ends in 2024.

Rutland County Sheriff's Department FY23 Contract: Board voted to approve FY23 Contract with RCSD.

Speed Limit Update: Moved to July 14th, Cathy briefly reviewed process, other factors to consider, amending the Traffic Ordinance, include Stop Sign rules, and the need for volunteers to work on it.

Town Fun Day Bonfire: Kevin reported he and Glenn Merrill (and the TVFD) will oversee the bonfire, light it, put it out and re-seed area on the ball field near the big stone. Board agreed by consensus.

Better Places Grant: Alan Held called to ask the Select Board to support a Better Places grant for his idea for tennis and pickle ball courts, and a rec area on Merrill Spring Road. Board agreed by consensus.

Feedback Form - None

Executive Session – Board voted to enter Executive Session at 8:45 to discuss potential real estate transaction, invited Gail. Board exited at 8:52. Board voted to authorize Meadow Squier and Gail Fallar to pursue a real estate matter.

Next Meetings Schedule ~ Thursday, July 14^{th} no meeting on June 28^{th} . Meeting on the 14^{th} will begin at 6:00 with a town garage discussion with the Eaton family.

Planning Commission ~ 6/16/22

Members present in-person: Michael Fallar, Larry Carabeau, Judy Gilmore, and Andy Gilmore.

Members present via Zoom: Vito Macaluso, Pat Psholka, Rainbow Squier, Kim Harbaugh, and Bob Lloyd.

Others present: in-person, Ed Bove, Ex. Director of the Rutland Regional Planning Commission (RRPC) and Gail Fallar, Secretary.

Ed Bove, RRPC, noted he was the Executive Director only for the next 10 days, when he would then step down and work on special projects for RRPC, our Town Plan update being one of them. He advised that the Town Plan was last adopted in 2017, so it needs to be re-adopted by 2025 (every 8 years). It was amended in 2020 to add an Energy Section. The good news is that it contains all the necessary elements required by statute, but could use updating census data, and some work on font styles, formatting. RRPC can help with that. Gail inquired about state grants – Ed advised that updating town plan grants are pretty hard to get.

Ed reviewed the first Town Plan, adopted in 1974, stating it was very well done, and noted that the Objectives list is still the same, surviving all the revisions and updates since then, including the 2007 Town Plan of the Year (Vermont Planners Association). He passed around a copy for members to review.

Rainbow advised that the Equity and Inclusion Committee's Research and Development Working Group was thinking about conducting a survey regarding the town's future and wondered if a combined survey could be useful with the update. Members briefly discussed the survey done for the 2017 update. Should it be mailed, done by survey monkey, town's website, or a combination of those, no decision made.

Members discussed the similarities with today's concerns and those in 1974, keeping the town rural, agricultural, though we are now down to one dairy farm. Subdivisions, development, preserving ag/open land . . .

Homework will be for members to read the original 1974 and current 2020 Town Plans and determine any areas of concern, issues that need to be addressed. PC will meet in August to discuss, and meet with Ed again in September.

No updates on other proposed subdivisions – still waiting for surveyors to complete work.

Next meeting will be August 18th, no meeting in July.

Conservation Commission ~ 6/13/22

New Business:

Rainbow reported that Nelson Jaquay has resigned from the Commission. She thanked him for all his input and service and suggested that at a future meeting we all sign a card of appreciation and thanks to be sent to him.

Colleen Balch offered to fill his position and has been approved by the Select Board. She attended this evening's meeting via Zoom.

Ongoing Business:

As an overview of our Green Up day activities, Ed reported that we had good attendance. Doug commented that 30 people collected 35 bags of trash, and that fully half of the attendees were children. Safety vests were offered to all attendees and a variety of prizes awarded to the youngsters. Virtually all roads in Tinmouth were covered either by attendees or by the "Adopt-a-Road" participants, who cover a section of town roads from year to year. All in all, the effort was a success.

Rainbow announced the need to reschedule the workday, which had been planned for May 21, 2022. She apologized for forgetting to publish reminders and while Doug F. had all the materials ready, there were insufficient attendees to carry out the work. All agreed that we need to publish our intended workdays in both the *Tales of Tinmouth* and on Front Porch Forum in order to attract more attendance. Often, in the past, noncommission members have helped out when there has been sufficient notice of the schedule of a workday.

A tentative workday was scheduled for July 23, 2022 with a 9:00 start at the Ridge Trail Kiosk. The projected work would include the renewal of bog bridges, cutting of new switchbacks and blockage of the old trail portions replaced by the new switchbacks. (Volunteers needed!)

Doug F. commented that he might not be able to attend but that he could have the trailer loaded and ready to go. Chuck agreed to haul the trailer if needed as he has used Doug's trailer in the past. All agreed that Rainbow should confirm the scheduled date before hand by email to all commission members and publish the intended date and time in the *Tales* and FPF.

Rainbow did a screen share, so that members attending could review the submissions to the Photo Contest. Many submissions were made, and many participants could not

decide which of multiple submissions to pick, so they included several, and left it to Rainbow to pick a favorite. This turned out to be a difficult task, but the members agreed that we should hold to the rule that we only accept one photograph per participant. After considerable discussion of how the voting should occur on Tinmouth Town Day July 9, 2022, it was agreed that submissions be numbered and that voters pick their three favorite photos and rank them. While the photos will be projected in a continuous loop, it was suggested that printed proof sheets with all the submissions be available to help with voting, and that we should award prizes for the youngsters who made submissions. There are a number of prizes left over from Green Up day that could be used for this purpose. Commission members will be needed for vote tallying on Town Day following the voting.

Other Business:

Doug F. reported that he took the 4th, 5th, and 6th grade class from the Tinmouth Mountain School, on a kayak tour of the Tinmouth Channel. He mentioned that the 6th graders had produced a Water Quality Report on the Channel and suggested that the Commission review it.

Jeff questioned the positioning of signs for Amphibian Crossings and suggested that we really should be posting zones of crossing, not single points. Chuck pointed out that one of our crossing signs on Route 140 near Nelson's house, has disappeared, leaving only the posts. A discussion of purchasing additional signs and securing them was tabled to a future meeting.

Next regular meeting was set for August 22, 2022 at 7:30 PM.

Tinmouth Community Fund Annual Meeting ~ 6/2/22

Present: Jan Krantz (Chair), Cathy Reynolds (Treasurer), Melody Squier (Vice Chair), Casey Voigtlaender, Lisa Patry, Todd Dennis, Helen Mango (Secretary), and numerous residents of the Town of Tinmouth.

Jan called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. She started by stating that for the first time the TCF is combining the awards ceremony with the annual meeting. She said that, pending nomination, Casey would be taking over as Chair of the TCF at the end of the meeting. Jan gave a very brief summary of the history of the TCF. The Fund began 23 years ago using \$85,000 in funds leftover from the building of the Community Center. The non-profit TCF was created using these funds as seed money. At first there were just Community Grants, then in 2012 the Continuing Education fund was added. In 2014 the K-12 Camp Scholarship fund was started, and in 2020 Small Business grants were added. Special large projects (such as the acoustic panels on the ceiling of the Community Center) have been funded periodically.

Treasurer's report:

Cathy reported that the TCF would be awarding \$13,150 at this evening's event. This leaves the fund with \$211,267. The Continuing Education Fund would be awarding \$17,700, leaving a balance of \$321,780.

Board member elections:

There are three 3-year positions and one 2-year replacement position available on the TCF board.

Cathy, Melody and Helen have all agreed to continue on the TCF board. Gail nominated the above three, and Martha Stanley for the 2-year replacement position. All were elected.

Old Creamery Committee ~ 6/23/22

Present in-person were members Michael Fallar and Doug Fontein, members present via Zoom were Stan Wilbur and Vito Macaluso.

Others present were Gail Fallar- scribe in-person, and via Zoom: Rene Wilbur, Sherry Johnson and Kim Harbaugh.

Committee re-organized. Michael was chosen as Chair, Gail volunteered to continue as scribe. Minutes of 4/20/19 (last committee meeting) were read and approved as written

Gail, as town treasurer, reported a current balance of \$5,948.61. Increase is due to donations made in memory of former Chair Grant Reynolds who passed in 2021, and a 2021 Community Fund grant written by Michael.

Members discussed work plan for this year, as well as projects to apply for ARPA funding from the Select Board.

1. Paint the east wall, bottom that was re-clapped has been done. Re-side and paint the south wall – claps are too far gone to simply re-nail.

- 2. Run electricity from the town office to the Old Creamery building to a sub-panel.
- 3. 'Clean' room build a storage room $10\frac{1}{2}$ feet by 14 feet using the door on the north side of the building. Ceiling joists need replacing and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch sheetrock, walls to be $\frac{1}{4}$ inch sheetrock covering old surfaces, a new wall on the south and a small spur on the west. Window to be re-glazed to allow in light.
- 4. Ramp (covered ?) from porch to door on north side entry to 'clean' room.

'Clean' Room = Storage room for Conservation Commission signs, Historical Society items, folks using the bake oven, etc.

After discussion, Stan volunteered to contact Lothar Schmelzenbach regarding estimates/evaluation for replacing or reglazing windows and re-siding the south wall. Michael will work on an estimate for the ramp – need to check handicap requirements. Gail will contact another electrician (the one hired last year was a no show) and a painter for estimates. A plan for the Clean Room also needs to be developed – concern was expressed regarding all the interior lead paint. There is no paint on the south wall, having been exposed to the weather for decades.

The Select Board has developed guidelines for ARPA projects, Michael is on the ARPA Committee, will take Old Creamery Projects to that entity. The SB also needs a narrative detailing how the project benefits the community, potential importance, etc.

~ Backyard Burning Reminders Released ~

MONTPELIER, Vermont – With spring and summer cleaning underway, the Department of Environmental Conservation wants to remind and encourage Vermonters to follow a few guidelines for on-premise or backyard open burning.

Burning materials from spring cleanup can release harmful pollution that can impact neighboring properties. By following these guidelines, Vermonters can help reduce air pollution, avoid nuisance impacts, and protect human and environmental health.

The on-premise or backyard burning of brush, deadwood, or tree cuttings collected from normal property maintenance is allowed under the Vermont Air Pollution Control Regulations, as long as no public or private nuisance, such as excessive smoke, is created. These guidelines can help Vermonters avoid creating nuisance impacts during on-premise or backyard burning:

- Allow green materials to dry prior to burning
- Consider the wind speed and direction before beginning the burn
- Postpone burning if atmospheric conditions are not favorable to disperse the smoke
- Ensure that the fire burns hot

• Obtain a local burn permit from the town fire warden Glenn Merrill – 802-446-2782.

"Our best suggestion is to avoid burning altogether and let the materials decompose naturally," said John Wakefield, the Department of Environmental Conservation's Compliance Section Chief for the Air Quality and Climate Division. Additional tips on what to do with excess leaves, grass, and wood – such as composting and brush piles – can be found on this Waste Management and Prevention Division webpage (https://bit.ly/3L6wVxy).

Editor's Note: Tinmouth's Solid Waste Ordinance <u>prohibits</u> burning trash or solid waste. All solid waste and recyclables are to be disposed of at the Transfer Station. No burn barrels or burn piles are allowed.

She valued old friendships, and she frequently visited and brought books to my grandmother, who was so elderly she couldn't hear and was living in the Meadows. Sue valued justice. She worked as a mentor for children whose parents were incarcerated. She loved the outdoors and I enjoyed many good skiing expeditions with her and her dog. She sang and performed in various singing groups, and at the Tinmouth and Grace church. She was a talented vocalist and musician. I miss her very much. She would be very pleased with the success of her memorial scholarship.

Bear Co-existence Advisory from Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department

The Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department is receiving reports from across the state of black bears seeking food in yards, outbuildings, and livestock enclosures this spring. Many of these situations can be prevented if people take steps to make their backyards bear-safe before a bear shows up.

Bears—and people—are at risk when bears spend time in human-dominated landscapes. And every time a bear finds an easy meal of birdseed, compost, or unsecured garbage, they are learning a dangerous association between people and food. Coexisting with bears starts with **you** taking the following steps to help keep bears wild:

- **Birdfeeders are a big problem!** Take down birdfeeders until December. You can attract birds by planting bird friendly native plants instead—check out Audubon's Native Plants for Birds Program: https://www.audubon.org/native-plants
- Make your garbage inaccessible. Store garbage in a secure structure and a bear proof container. Learn how to make your garbage can bear proof here:
 - https://vtfishandwildlife.com/sites/fishandwildlife/files/documents/Learn%20More/Living%20with%20Wildlife/Living%20with%20Bears/bearresistant-retrofit-polycart.pdf
- Dispose of garbage frequently. If you have pick-up services, wait until the morning to put your garbage out.
- Follow steps for composting in bear country. Compost needs to be 3 parts brown materials to 1 part kitchen scraps, turned frequently, and kept in a sturdy tumbler or bin: https://vtfishandwildlife.com/node/260

- Use electric fencing to keep chickens and bees safe. Fences need to be 4,000-6,000 volts, tested regularly and baited:
- Clean your grill after every use.
- Make bears feel uncomfortable in your yard. Yell, bang pots and pans, or use other noise devices from inside your home. Never shoot a bear to scare it. Even BBs can seriously injure bears.
- Please report your bear encounters to Vermont Fish & Wildlife. These reports allow us to help you prevent future bear incidents. They also give us information to help all Vermonters better coexist with bears: https://anrweb.vt.gov/FWD/FW/WildlifeBearReport.aspx

Following these steps can save bears' lives, and help protect you, your neighbors, and your property. Please do your part to be a good neighbor and help keep Vermont's bears wild!


