This is a family and kid-friendly event, so please bring your young ones so they can share the fun (and maybe learn a little about civic responsibility and protecting our environment).

There won't be a Green Up activity at the school this year, so this is your kiddos' opportunity to be part of the team! People are also welcome to do DIY Green UP by getting bags from the Town Office and cleaning a section of roadside as your schedule allows. But we urge you to come with your family on Saturday morning to help build community momentum for this important and fun activity.

~ Amphibian Crossing Alert ~

You may have noticed some brightly-colored amphibian crossing signs on the roadsides in Tinmouth. These are placed by the Tinmouth Conservation Commission in areas where there are known migration routes for salamanders, frogs and turtles. These animals move on a seasonal basis to their breeding and egg-laying sites and are at risk of being killed by car traffic where their paths cross roads.

Please slow down and avoid hitting animals when you see these signs on the roads. There are especially high numbers of amphibians moving on rainy spring nights, so pay extra attention in those conditions. If you'd like to know more about amphibian migration, go to www.vtherpatlas.org. Please do not hit, move or disturb our signs, many of which are hand-made, and please contact me if you see a sign that's damaged or moved. The signs will be removed around July 1 and stored until next year.

BOOK SALE on May 13th from 8 AM until 2 PM.


It is at the Old Creamery next to the Town Office. *There will be all kinds of books for all ages.*

To the Tinmouth Community,

Ahhh! We're in the home stretch of the 2022-2023 school year. The final six weeks of school are devoted to state and district testing and field trips.

This year the State of Vermont is implementing a new state assessment. This involves re-training of teachers and navigating the nuances of a new software platform. Students completed the English Language Arts (ELA) online exam during the last week of April. It was a seamless transition due to teacher expertise and experience as well as student resiliency. Math and Science assessments will be completed before the year ends.

District testing measures student growth in ELA and Mathematics throughout the year and helps to establish a baseline for the 2023-2024 school year. Students will also be taking these assessments before year end.

May and June are also when field trips are prevalent. Our major school-wide field trip this year will be to the McAuliffe-Shepherd Discovery Center in Concord, New Hampshire. Our PreK students can't travel by school bus to New Hampshire for various reasons. They will be visiting *Hildene* to study chickens! When they return to school, they will be incubating fertile chicken eggs. Many thanks to Josh and Meadow Squire for donating the eggs!

The sixth graders are traveling to Boston this year. They are scheduled to visit the Freedom Trail, the Science Museum, and Faneuil Hall. They will also be taking a Duck Boat Tour around Boston.

Many other school activities are scheduled including our Spring Celebration, Field Day, Pizza Oven Lunch, and a school-wide Picnic at the Wallingford Boys Camp.

Graduation is on the evening of June 8th. We have 10 sixth graders advancing to Mill River Middle School in the fall of 2023. We're very proud of each of our graduates and will truly miss them!

Each student wrote a brief essay or letter from the perspective of one of these characters and envisioned what their lives would be like as a catastrophic dust storm approached. This is the last of the six essays. Together these essays provided insight into a day in the life of a family during the Dust Bowl Era.

s morning with cold dust filled lu

I woke up this morning with cold dust filled lungs and the sound of Grandma Ellie coughing.

Grandma Ellie has had dust pneumonia ever since she was 42 and now she's 55. After I got out of bed and got dressed, I went down stairs and asked Ma if Aunt Sally had left yet. Ma replied "yes".

Ma asked "why are you asking?"

I said "because I wanted to go to work with her today".

Ma asks if I "Can milk the cows this morning"?

I say" Yes."

Before I go out Katie asks me if "Can you play with me"?

"I say maybe later, I have to milk the cows right now". The barn sways back and forth while I'm milking the cows. That means there's a dust storm coming. After I'm done milking the cows I run in and yell to ma, "There's a dust storm coming".

But she doesn't respond. I ask Katie, my little sister, where Ma is. She says she's "Giving Aunt Sally her lunch".

When Ma comes home, I rush out to meet her. I tell her "A dust storm is coming".

Soon after Aunt Sally came running home. They let her leave the post office early because a dust storm was coming.

After we were done with putting the rags on the windows, we all huddled up in the living room. Ma could not find Katie so Aunt Sally went outside. Shortly after a gust of wind blew the front door and wind blew all through our house.

Ma started to get worried about Aunt Sally. Then we hear a sharp sound of glass breaking and a picture of

the family flies bye. Grandma Ellie runs out and tries to grab it but she falls and a piece of glass cuts her neck. Then the dust storm starts to let up and Aunt Sally and Katie come in. Katie has a cut leg and Aunt Sally cut arm then we hear Grandma Ellie say something but we could not make out what she said. Grandma Ellie was fine after a few minutes and put some rags with honey on Grandma and Katie.

The dust storm stopped and Ma's friend came after the storm and left us an apple pie. We had the pie with some dust covered biscuit. At the bottom of the pie containers there was a note that read "Thank you for all you have helped me with but I have to get out of the dust. Sincerely, Charlotte."

It turned out everyone was okay.

He jogged down the wrong road. She went up the wrong driveway. He rang the wrong doorbell. They went to the wrong nightclub. Actually, there is nothing wrong about doing any of these - except the shootings that left them dead.

Leaving church, a parishioner said to me, "It can happen anywhere, anytime, to anyone." But being shot is most likely to occur here in the States, where the incidence of gun violence far exceeds any other country. It is hard to believe that tens-of-thousands of our people die every year from gunshots (CDC). If any nation or terrorist group did that, we'd be sending the troops after them. Yet, little is done to curb this violence and the suffering it causes. Why?

The reasons have a lot to do with our fears, our faith, our loves and our lack of inner freedom, to broadly name some of them. One more I would mention here - the now undervalued divine imperatives that for millennium have been the civilizing safeguards in societies, like the Sixth Commandment of Moses, "Do not kill/murder." In stark contrast, our culture unremittingly reinforces the efficacy of violent force and the legitimacy of weapons to carry it out. We are feeding our minds death and reaping it in real life.

Religious faith can bring us back to our moral senses, if it doesn't also justify and bless recourse to violence. Remember the "*Golden Rule*?" "Do to others as you would have them do to you." It certainly rules out shooting anyone. It is still a good foundation to right what's wrong.

The first: The Old Honor Roll

(Excerpts from Old Town Reports)

Tinmouth Town Meeting 80 Years Ago

Tinmouth Local and School Meeting March 2, 1943

- 32. Voted a resolution which will be annexed to the Minutes of this Meeting.
- 33. On a motion made by E. C. Taylor it was voted by voice vote to have an Honor Roll erected for the Boys from this Town who are in the armed services of our country in the present conflict.
- 34. The Moderator was empowered to appoint a Committee to erect a suitable marker. Edward C. Taylor and Clarence J. Wilbur were appointed.
- 38. Resolution referred to as in number 32.

Whereas the Citizens of the Town of Tinmouth have been called upon to do their utmost to furnish foods and supplies for the men and women who are fighting in the Armed Services with our Allies to regain and maintain a World of Freedom and Democracy and to the Citizens in the countries that have been deprived of their foods and supplies by the Brutes of Germany, Italy and Japan, We the Citizens of the Town of Tinmouth pledge ourselves to the following resolution:

Resolved that the Citizens of Tinmouth pledge their unstinting effort to further the production of Farm Foods and supplies obtained from this source, with the willingness of each and every person doing his or her part to plant, care for, harvest and produce food for this great cause."

Resolved that the Citizens of Tinmouth petition the Federal Government to leave these Farmers and their families sufficient farm products for home consumption and furnish as much as possible with machinery, seeds, fertilizer, petroleums and other production factors together with a fair and just return for work, investment and risks involved.

Resolved that this resolution be spread upon the record in the Town Clerks office in Tinmouth Vt., and that a copy be sent to the Honorable Claude R. Wickards, United States Secretary of Agriculture and copies to the members of the Vermont delegations in Congress of the United States.

Signed by and for the people at the Local Election at Tinmouth, Vt., on Tuesday March 2,1943. Attested, Edward E. Weeks, Town Clerk"




Jan. 10, 1952 Order No. 57 Ernest Lidstone, rebuild, paint and letters on Tinmouth on Tinmouth Honor Roll.

The Tinmouth Honor Roll listing Tinmouth residents who served in World War II hung on the front of the old church for many years. The sign had been repainted and reconstructed several times over the years and at some point, Korean War veterans were added to the Honor Roll. The Honor Roll was saved when the Church burned in 1969 and moved to the Fire Station.

This monument was erected as part of Tinmouth's celebration of Vermont's Bicentennial of admittance as the 14th state to the United States (1791-1991). It was carved by Michal Fannin, Tinmouth stone wright, and is a piece of marble from the old quarry on the Wright's (now Inkley's) property on the town trail part of town highway #20. The quarry has been long out of operation.

* * * * *

After the new marble monument honoring all war veterans was placed next to the town office, the Old Honor Roll was stored in the Town Shed and fell into a state of disrepair. After comments by several persons listed on the Honor Roll, the Historical Society, with the support of the Selectboard undertook the task of having the sign restored. In 2008 Kevin Merrill, who repainted the sign several years ago, did a great job in rebuilding and painting the sign and it was hung on the Old Town Shed.

At least two World War II Veterans, Elizabeth Young and Hugh Young need to be added to the Honor Roll. Elizabeth Young was a member of the Cadet Nurse Corps during the war and retired from the Air Force as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1971. Hugh Young enlisted in the Army at age 18 upon his graduation from Wallingford High School and worked in Eisenhower's Headquarters in Bushey Park, London and Versailles Palace in France.

On Sunday September 28, 2008, the Tinmouth Historical & Genealogical Society hosted a rededication of the Tinmouth Honor Roll listing Tinmouth residents who served in World War II and Korea. The ceremony took place at the Town Sheds on Mountain View Road in Tinmouth Center and included an American Legion color guard, oration by Chuck Clarino, Rutland Herald reporter who had interviewed and written stories about many World War II veterans, music, refreshments, and a time for reflections by surviving "boys and girls" of Tinmouth and family members of those who have passed away. Honorees present at the event were Roland Wilbur. Frederick "Hod" Hepburn, Harley Weeks and Wilbur McIntyre.

Select Board ~ 4/3/2023 ~ Special Meeting

Members present (in-person): Meadow Squier, Kevin Eaton, and Judy Gilmore

Others present: In-person: Eric Buffum-Road Commissioner, Cathy Reynolds, and Gail Fallar-SBA

Via Zoom: Steffanie Bourque – Municipal Project Manager (RRPC), Sherry Johnson, Kim Harbaugh, and Rick Fallar

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the Request for Proposals (RFP) for Design Engineering Services for the TAP grant for the salt/sand shed.

Steffanie provided an update to bring Judy up to speed on the project, reviewing the process from the beginning. She noted she thought the Consultant Selection Committee (Cathy, Eric and Gail) appointed by the Select Board in December, had the authority to decide about the RFP. The Select Board decided they wanted to be part of that decision and at their meeting in February decided to proceed with an RFP.

Steffanie then explained the choices:

- 1) spend out of pocket (not eligible for grant reimbursement) with the prior engineer (Otter Creek Engineering);
- 2) go out to bid for the RFP; or
- 3) choose from the State's **At the Ready** engineering list and proceed with one of those companies.

Board discussed options, time line, need for the state to grant a categorical exclusion once the conceptual plans have been completed, next grant deadline (September), whether or not any local firms would bother to bid (Rutland had no luck), huge increase in costs, etc. In the end, the Board decided by consensus to proceed with the RFP, if no one bids, then move to the **At the Ready** list.

Board and CSC reviewed the draft RFP. It was noted that the scope of work could be changed (for instance reduce the size of the structure or building just a salt shed); topo work may have to re-done as the site now has a massive amount of fill on it. After more discussion, Board voted to approve the RFP as edited.

Once bids are received, they will be ranked, by the SB and CSC members, independently. Then all will meet to make the final decision. Once the Design Engineer is chosen there will need to be a steering committee to work with them to get to the final plans to go to bid for construction. SB will think about this committee.

In other business, Cathy inquired about the FEMA/OEC grant for the generators for the fire house and the town office. What does the SB want for a process? After brief discussion, the SB decided that Cathy, Kevin and Gail will review bids/create an RFP to send out, bids due by May SB meeting. Need to spend grant by September.

Select Board ~ 4/13/2023

Mr. Medash was present to provide information about the NFIP – National Flood Insurance Program. He briefly described the program, noted that anyone in town could buy flood insurance, not just those in the Flood Plain. He noted that if a disaster strikes – such as Tropical Storm Irene, having the flood plain regulations provides for more reimbursement from the state. Another way to increase the state's payment is to also adopt River Corridor regulations. He will send an information packet for the Planning Commission to review. One of his jobs is to provide guidance to the zoning administrator if someone wants a permit to build in the Flood Hazard Zone. Those present recalled the events of Irene, how the Channel area became a huge sponge that absorbed water from the storm until it looked like a lake, how it slowly released the water over a couple of weeks, how volunteers worked to keep culverts free from clogging and worked to keep people safe.

Members reviewed the **agenda**, added Lance Somers' driveway permit, RFP for paving bids and clarification of ARPA funds for the right of way legal costs.

Citizen's Input – Sherry expressed support for posting meeting recordings on the town's website (on the agenda).

David spoke to Emerald Ash Borer (not on the agenda). He spoke with Eric about flagging trees on Route 140 to get started and asked the SB about notifying landowners – create a pamphlet, notify on Front Porch Forum, etc, SB agreed, but no decision was made on who was to do it.

Marshall raised concerns with Ron Hill and his son RJ, burning trash and brush on a Red Flag Warning Day - a very dangerous endeavor. The fire warden and the fire department were called. It was also noted that RJ continues to drive, but has no driver's license. The SB was asked to address the problem immediately. They added it to the May SB agenda.

Public Works Update – Request for Proposals for Design Engineering have been publicly posted and emailed to engineering firms.

Highway – Eric reported the road crew has been busy grading, fighting beavers, and building stairs in the new town garage. Plows have been painted and put away, and the wing is off the grader. The grader had another broken rim, welding is not holding. There are 6 tires on the grader, he asked to order more rims – wait for them to be

built – there are no new or used available. Board approved. Eric noted the gravel budget is over spent, but winter salt is under budget, asked to move that amount to the gravel line, Board approved.

Lance and Jenny Somers Driveway Permit - 325 Mountain View Road, Eric advised it did not need a culvert, no tree trimming, good to go. Board voted to approve.

Chloride Contract – Board reviewed briefly, then voted to approve.

McCoy Road – Board discussed concerns raised about snow plowing, sanding, and deep mud. Kevin will speak to all involved.

Paving RFP – Board reviewed draft for paving on Route 140 starting at the Wallingford town line and going .8 miles east. If the town gets a state paving grant, will be able to nearly reach the Tinmouth Cemetery. Approved with minor edits, will be due for May 11th meeting.

Guidelines for Purchasing Used Equipment – Meadow had tweaked a bit, Board voted to approve.

VTRANS Grant Applications – Board reviewed both; paving on Route 140 as well as another for a structure - to replace the culvert near the Patrys on North East Road, all approved submitting.

Grant In Aide – Board voted to send Letter of Intent to participate in the program in FY24.

RRPC Mutual Aide Agreement – Board voted to approve the Agreement. This Mutual Aide is for highway equipment and/or assistance with other towns in Rutland County.

Financial Reports – Board reviewed reports and warrants and voted to approve all.

ARPA Expenditure – Board agreed by consensus to allocate the legal fees paid for the attempt to obtain a right of way from Mountain View Road from the ARPA funds. Total is \$1,650.

Debit Card Guidelines – Board reviewed, made suggestions, will review again at their May meeting.

Health Officer – Meadow submitted her resignation as Health Officer. Board accepted with thanks for her service. Board voted to submit/recommend Jeffrey Warfle to the Vermont Department of Health to become Tinmouth's new Health Officer.

Annual Appointments – Meadow moved to appoint all annual appointees with the exception of Michael Fallar to the Equity and Inclusion Committee. There was no second. The SBA suggested an executive session was needed to discuss personnel. Meadow asked Michael if he wanted to do that, Michael replied no, he preferred the discussion to be in open meeting. There was much discussion, Meadow read a statement regarding breaking the tradition of appointing those willing to serve, that also spoke to Michael's creation of a hostile environment for the E & I Committee. She is also the Chair of that Committee. There was much back and forth between

Meadow and Michael. Melody also read a statement of support to not re-appoint Michael, noting his negativity. Judy and Kevin wanted more information, and decided to attend the next E & I Committee meeting – May 16th. In the end, the Board voted to appoint and re-appoint everyone except the E & I Committee.

As no one volunteered to be on the Recreation Committee, the SB decided one was not needed at the moment and dissolved it. There are also now **vacancies** on the Safety and Wellness Committee and the Energy Committee as Ray Pratt stepped down from those to serve as the new Emergency Management Director. Matt Patry was appointed by Ray to be the new Emergency Management Coordinator. (See separate listing at the end of Meeting Highlights for other annual appointments.)

Website Policy - Board reviewed the updated policy submitted by the Website Committee, Board voted to approve as presented.

.GOV domain – Todd explained this would move the town website to a more secure domain, and that it is now free. SB had approved in 2021, but had not completed the procedure. He provided the letter needed, and the steps to be taken. Once approved, website will be at .gov instead of .org. Board voted to approve.

Todd also spoke about a proposal to provide **email addresses for town officers** – so they don't have to use their own, which can be subject to Public Record requests. He will send a summary for the SB to consider.

CLA Redetermination Agreement – Board voted to ratify Meadow's action of signing the Agreement (due to deadline). The Redetermination request resulted in it changing from 77% to 79%.

Re-appraisal Proposal – Gail, as Chair of the Board of Listers, requested permission to negotiate with Douglas MacArthur for reappraisal consultation. Mr. MacArthur has done Tinmouth's reappraisals the last three times it was done. By consensus, Board approved.

LEMP/NIMS – After brief discussion Board voted to approve the annual Local Emergency Management Plan (LEMP) and NIMS.

Opioid Settlement – After brief discussion, Board voted to authorize Gail to respond on behalf of the Town to the proposed settlement.

Meeting Recordings on Website – Nancy spoke in support of uploading all meetings' recordings to the town's website – which is really a link to YouTube. Board voted to approve request.

Members Concerns – None

Correspondence – Gail reported the Stan and Rene Wilbur recently donated artwork by Annemie Curlin, which was commissioned for the new courthouse in Rutland in 2005. It depicts the center of town as perceived by the artist. It will hang in the Old Fire House.

Present were members Michael Fallar, Larry Carabeau, Andy Gilmore and Judy Gilmore in person and Bob Lloyd, Kim Harbaugh, Vito Macaluso and Pat Psholka via Zoom. Also present were Gail Fallar, Sec. and Sherry Johnson via Zoom.

Members discussed advice from Ed Bove and Barbara Noyes-Pulling from the Rutland Regional Planning Commission regarding updating the energy section of the town plan. The state is currently revising standards and maps and other requirements and updating data, so at this time it makes more sense to not undertake a review until that work is completed.

Members discussed various types of renewable energy, including nuclear, hydro, and wind.

Gail reported that the Select Board had had a presentation on the new Flood Hazard Insurance Program that included a brief discussion of river corridors. The PC will be receiving information about possible steps to take to protect these. In Tinmouth these include the Channel with turns into the Clarendon River, on its way to Lake Champlain via Otter Creek; the Poultney River which starts up in the Purchase on the northwest part of town and flows through Middletown Springs into Poultney also on its way to Lake Champlain, and Flower Brook and Wells Brook which flow southwest to the Mettowee River.

Speed Limit Committee ~ 4/20/23

Present were members Jeff Warfle, Kevin Eaton, Hollis Squier, Sherry Johnson(via zoom), and Ray Pratt, as well as Kim Harbaugh (via zoom), Alice Hoisington and Gail Fallar.

Members reviewed draft ordinances, including one from VLCT. Committee needs to remember to add to it – that all certified officers can enforce it, list of stop signs, list of roads and their speeds, speed feed-back signs.

Members worked on a map of all roads and their current speed limits and the location of stop and yield signs.

Members will review other sample ordinances sent by VLCT for their next meeting on May 25th.

~ 1971 Marble Valley Baseball League Trophy ~


