We usually associate this acronym with that final "rest" we call death. At that end point, all striving has certainly ceased and we "rest". And "peace"? Well, hopefully the passing was peaceful. What about "peace" as an ongoing state of eternal being? Well,

hopefully. Some of us believe so. Some of us have had signs or dreams or visitations from beyond that give us peace. Some of us remain restless for want of either.

We don't have to wait for R.I.P. to "rest", of course, although in our hectic lives, it can be elusive. Judaism and Christianity, among other religions, have a weekly day of rest built into their personal and communal life, a Shabbat/Sabbath. This day of rest is rooted in a theological paradigm that God rested after bringing Creation into being, so we need to rest after our work "week" as well.

Resting on Shabbat/Sabbath is meant as a time for physical, emotional, and spiritual renewal, so important for our health and well-being. As important as work is for our sense of purpose, provision, and worth, and as a way of contributing to the good of society, being on the go-go-go wears us down. When Communist Russia under Stalin tried enforcing a 7-day work week, it wore the people out and had to be nixed. We can find ourselves doing much the same. Burnout is not uncommon.

Wouldn't it be nice to have an extended Shabbat/Sabbath, a sabbatical of sorts that is also a spiritual retreat? This month, for the first time, I have done just that. Rather than retiring or taking a vacation in which I'm likely to be just as busy, I have extended my day of rest to a month of rest with an emphasis on using that time as a spiritual retreat. Turns out, rest came by way of sickness for the first half of the month - a sure sign I needed just that. Now, physically rested up, I have more energy than I've known in a long time. Now I am able to attend to the "spiritual retreat" aspect of my sabbatical as I listen to the rest of what the Spirit is saying and rest in a peace that is alive with gratitude, awe and wonder at the life we've been given.

Needing Shabbat/Sabbath, perhaps a "sabbatical" of sorts as well? R & R to rest and reflect? They are so healing and healthy for body, mind and spirit. Now is the time, before we R.I.P.


The **Theater in the Woods Camp** will present showcases of each camp's work on the following dates:

~ Discover Books Book Collection Program Launches in Rutland County ~

Tinmouth is one of the locations to get a collection box – located at the Transfer Station near the Zero-Sort Bin.

Hopefully it will be here by the end of July.

Rutland County, Vermont (July 12, 2023) – The Solid Waste Alliance Communities (SWAC) and Rutland County Solid Waste District (RCSWD) are pleased to announce their collaboration with Discover Books to launch a book collection program in multiple locations in Rutland County. *Collection locations should be in place by the end of July 2023*.

Approximately 2 billion pounds of books in the U.S. are wasted each year! Although books are mostly paper, they are challenging to recycle because of the adhesives that bind them.

Discover Books is a book collection and online reselling company which re-distributes, resells, donates, and recycles used books giving books a new life through online sales and charitable donations.

Since its inception, Discover Books has donated over 10 million books to non-profit organizations in North America and internationally. That number continues to grow. They have also recycled over 500 million pounds of paper, saving books from landfill demise.

Discover Books believes reuse is the best possible form of recycling and focuses on getting used books into the hands of people who want and need them most rather than allowing them to become waste.

In addition to all hardcover and softcover books, Discover Books also collects videos, DVDs, and audiobooks.

Select Board (SB) ~ 6/13/2023

Members present (in-person): Meadow Squier, Kevin Eaton, and Judy Gilmore

Others present:

In-person: Eric **Buffum-Road** Commissioner, Michael Fallar, Hollis Squier, and Gail Fallar-Select Board Assistant (SBA)

Via Zoom: Sherry Johnson, Kim Harbaugh, and Rick Fallar.

~ Highway ~

Public Works Update – Meadow reported the SB and CSC met jointly on May 17th and decided to recommend DuBois & King for the design engineering for the proposed salt/sand shed, pending negotiation. That negotiation resulted in the cost being reduced by \$7,800. After brief discussion, Board voted to award D & K the contract for \$53,060 for design engineering for the proposed salt/sand shed. Board then voted to dissolve the CSC. The SB will assume ongoing responsibilities required by the TAP grant.

Road Commissioner - Eric reported the road crew has been busy ditching, getting ready for paving. He noted the state had tentatively approved the culvert grant for North East Road, will wait for final approval before ordering the culvert. Reviewed summer work plan, discussed removal of the maple tree near Ballou's swamp – grinding stump will not be possible as there is ledge right there. Ditching is needed there per State stormwater rules. He advised that he would like to include a budget line for help with bigger construction projects, as Dan Allard will be needed for that tree and for replacing a culvert at the top of Cobb Hill before paving is done.

Used Grader Purchase Authorization – Eric presented request with specs to replace the grader as scheduled. Much discussion about whether the grader needed to be replaced, cost of repairs, hours used yearly, grader is a Champion which is hard to get parts for, John Deere and Cat are better choice, how to source another. Board asked Eric to research what is available. Board voted to approve Eric's request for authorization, all voted in favor.

Small Safety Grant – Board reviewed VTRANS grant application for \$35,000 to cut dead and dying trees on Route 140. Approved by consensus, Board also signed a letter of support.

Citizen Concerns ~ Hollis inquired about the large tree on the Butterfoss property on Route 140 – now that leaves have come out, there needs to be brush cut to improve visibility and safety. Eric will speak to Mr. Butterfoss about it. He also inquired about ditching on Route 140 near the Wallingford town line, wondering if stone would be added – Eric noted that state rules do not require it there - seeding and mulching will be enough. Hollis asked the

SB to take a look at the new culvert on North End Road – Potter's Brook, raising concerns about the need for headers, reflectors, and more stone in the ditches as they are quite deep. SB took under advisement.

Request for Proposals for Diesel Fuel and #2 Fuel Oil Board reviewed and approved draft RFP for FY24. Kudos were given to the late Bob Noble for his help in

establishing the RFP form a number of years ago.

End of Year ~ Eric noted the black truck needs 8 tires for next winter, dealers advised it would be a two month wait. He ordered them, they are here already, would like to purchase them in this fiscal year. Board agreed as there is room in this year's budget.

Financial Reports - Board reviewed and approved reports and warrants. Anticipated revenue includes \$200,000 paving grant and \$36,000 culvert project grant.

FY24 Wage and Salary Schedule ~ Board reviewed salaries, Listers request to increase their hourly rate for the re-appraisal work, Board approved all.

~ Old Business-

ARPA List Review ~ Board postponed until upcoming SB meeting on the 27th. Gail advised that the SB can transfer ARPA money into the Capital Building Reserve Fund, per VLCT ARPA staff.

RFP for Generator Grant - Board reviewed and approved draft RFP for electrical panel upgrade at the town office and on-demand generators for the town office and TVFD, due on the 27th.

~ New Business -

Equity and Inclusion Committee ~ Meadow reported Emma Weatherhogg had moved out of town and stepped down from the E&I Committee. She then moved to nominate Todd Dennis, Kim Harbaugh, Lothar Schmelzenbach, Melody Squier, Rainbow Squier and herself to be re-appointed, (all remaining members), except Michael Fallar. Much discussion about purpose of the committee, not appointing someone willing to serve who has a different point of view, how other members of the committee felt about it, etc. Eventually Kevin 2nded the motion. Meadow and Kevin voted in favor, Judy voted against.

Recreation Committee – Board postponed discussion until 27th.

SWAC Alternate ~ After brief discussion, Board voted to appoint Gail Fallar as an Alternate to the Solid Waste Alternatives Committee.

911 Road Name ~ As there is a 3rd house being added to a private right of way, it now needs an official road name. Owners chose North Meadow Lane, Select Board approved by consensus. It was formerly known as 174 Morgan Road, Route 133.

Next Meeting Schedule ~ Board decided to hold a special Board meeting on June 27th, next regular meeting on July 13.

Select Board ~ 6/27/2023 ~ Special Meeting

Highway ~

Board opened Diesel Fuel and #2 Fuel Oil bids.

Champlain Valley Fuels bid 15 cents over the Valero rack price in Rutland per gallon for both diesel fuel and #2 fuel oil. Also offered a set price for fuel oil.

Marcell Oil bid 15 cents over the Valero rack price in Rutland per gallon for both diesel fuel and #2 fuel oil, with a cap on fuel oil, also included furnace cleaning @ \$175 each.

After discussion, and consultation with the road commissioner, Board voted to accept Champlain Valley's proposal.

County Sheriff ~ Sheriff Fox discussed the FY24 contract for law enforcement services. He doesn't feel the town needs more hours, but is willing to shift officers around (can work earlier hours to catch early morning speeders) for more productive enforcement. After discussion, Board voted to approve the FY24 contract.

Recreation Committee ~ Robbie and Doug spoke to their willingness to serve on a recreation committee, along with Colleen Balch, all who are on the Conservation Commission. They have an interest in developing the town lot behind the town garage with a walking path, disc golf course and picnic tables. Others present suggested other properties to consider; conducting a survey to see what kind of recreation folks in town want/need; using the existing playground area, etc. Access to the south end of the town lot was discussed, currently that is by passing through the transfer station. After much discussion, Board voted to re-create a Recreation Committee with five members, appointing Doug Fontein, Robbie Leeds and Colleen Balch. SB will seek two more members.

Capital Building Fund Transfer ~ Board voted to transfer \$60,008 from the Capital Building Fund to the Highway to cover expenses for the new town garage (labor and materials) reimbursement.

Unlicensed Dog Warrant ~ Board approved and signed warrant for Animal Control Officers to round up unlicensed dogs.

Tinmouth Cemetery Association ~ Glenn, as President of the Tinmouth Cemetery Association (TCA) requested an increase of \$800 to the Town's allotment to help with maintenance of the cemetery. Judy advised that she is treasurer of the TCA. After brief discussion, Board voted

to approve the request for FY24 allotment increase from FY23 general fund.

EOC Grant Electrical Bids ~ Board opened bids from Stubbins Electric and Corey Electric.

Stubbins bid \$32,700 for the grant work and \$4,100 for the Old Creamery Project work.

Corey bid \$32,000 for the grant work and \$3,800 for the Old Creamery Project work.

After discussion, Board voted to accept Matt Corey's proposal.

Garmin Camera ~ Cathy spoke about the special camera requested in the grant. With a new Emergency Management Director advising it is no longer needed, Board voted to not purchase it.

Board discussed location of the generator and tank on the town office property – it is on the National Historic Register – so care must be taken with disturbance of soil and visibility.

Vacancies – Gail noted that the E & I Committee was created with 10 members, now only has 6, so 4 vacancies need to be advertised. Along with the two seats on the Rec Committee that need filling.

Fun Day ~ Cathy asked Eric about the town trucks being in the fun day **parade**, he said yes.

Planning Commission ~ 6/15/23

Members present in-person: Michael Fallar, Judy Gilmore, and Andy Gilmore; present via Zoom: Kim Harbaugh, Rainbow Squier, Pat Psholka, and Vito Macaluso.

Others: present in-person: Susan Mandel and Glen Morgan - applicants, and Gail Fallar Secretary; and via Zoom: Tom Morgan (applicant), Sherry Johnson, Carol Miller, and Ann Lundquist.

Subdivision Hearing for the Mandel and Morgan application for a one lot subdivision was called to order. Michael reviewed the requirements, members agreed that all that needed to be met, indeed were. After brief discussion, PC voted to approve as presented.

Members briefly discussed photos in old town plan, members will send comments on them to the secretary for work on the new plan. New photos were encouraged as well as captions/locations for those to be kept.

Rainbow will review photos from the Conservation Commission's photo contest to see if any of those will be helpful and send to the secretary.

Ed Bove, RRPC, will attend the July meeting, hopefully with a draft of work to date on the town plan update.

Town Plan update homework for next meeting – review photos in current plan, decide what to keep, what to replace, add captions, etc.; read Act 174; and review sections PC was to work on.

Conservation Commission ~ 6/19/23

Members Present: Ed Hasenohr, Rainbow Squier, Doug Fontein, Robbie Leeds, Colleen Balch, and Chuck Bronk Public Present: Gail Fallar and Doug Inkley.

Draft Minutes from April 24, 2023 were reviewed and approved with the correction of the Doug Fontein's commitment to brush hog a "trail" on the Town parcel South of the Transfer Station.

The agenda was accepted as warned with the addition of a discussion of the Town Lot under the discussion of future plans, projects and ideas.

On the subject of a recap of Green Up Day, it was noted that we had fewer children in attendance this year. Doug noted that he had spoken with Principal Maureen Fitzgerald-Riker and asked her to not do Green Up at Tinmouth Mountain School and to encourage her students to attend Green Up on Saturday. Ed Hasenohr suggested that next year we come up with a handout to go home with every student advertising our event and the prizes for participation, perhaps including a photo of a family at the event.

In order to Green Up the mess on Gulf Road, a tractor and a winch would be required along with a dump truck to haul the material to the metal dumpster. This would ideally be a separate project shared with the Road Crew. Ed agreed to discuss this with Eric Buffum, Road Commissioner.

A discussion of the 2023 Photo Contest. Rainbow noted that there had been 13 submissions as compared to 22 last year, and that virtually all were new submitters. Rainbow suggested that the deadline be extended to the first week in July and advertised in the Tales and Front Porch Forum. It was agreed that voting on paper for best photo worked last year and would continue this year. The Website Committee is still working on last year's photos. While there have been no further developments in the access to the Town Lot South of the Transfer Station, members discussed the overlap with the newly formed Recreation Committee. A site visit was planned for June 25th, meeting at 8 AM at the Transfer Station, to review possibilities for the site. It was noted that the road commissioner typically brush hogs the site once a year. The consensus was that this should take place following the completion of bird nesting in late August.

Rainbow encouraged members to come to the next meeting with ideas for conservation projects, speakers, and ways to increase participation in Commission events.

Next regular meeting be set for August 14, 2023.

Rainbow and Website Committee will get Trish into the necessary emails and calendars. Rainbow will train Trish.

Board reviewed and updated several Tinmouth Community Center (CC) documents including the Rental Agreement, Procedure for Building Use, and Manager Job Description. Rainbow will make the edits and send to the CC Board for review. Martha thanked Rainbow for all the updating. The CC Board appreciates the efforts for a smooth transition made by Rainbow.

For the most part, the school and CC Board have been happy with conditions after other use of the CC.

Community Fund Annual Meeting ~ 6/21/23

Present: Jan Krantz (Acting Chair), Cathy Reynolds (Treasurer), Melody Squier, Lisa Patry, Todd Dennis (Vice Chair), Martha Stanley, Helen Mango (Secretary), numerous residents of the Town of Tinmouth.

Jan gave a brief summary of the history of the Tinmouth Community Fund (TCF). The TCF is in its 23rd year. Ramsey and Patty Yoder were remembered as founding members of the TCF, and in whose spirit the TCF continues its work.

Treasurer's report:

The TCF is a committee of the Town of Tinmouth. Most of the funds are held and invested by the Vermont Community Foundation. Cathy, as TCF Treasurer, reported that the Community Fund has approximately \$190,000, which generates between \$7,000 and \$8,000 to be used for grants. The Continuing Education Fund has approximately \$316,000, of which \$15,000 is available for scholarships. The proceeds of the Tinmouth Plant Sale (about \$13,000) are also put towards all grants and scholarships.

Board member elections:

There is one vacancy on the TCF board and one "retiring" member. Lisa Patry has agreed to continue in her position on the TCF board. Cathy nominated Lynn Buffum,

seconded by Martha. Motion carried. Jan nominated Bess Lewis, seconded by Melody. Motion carried. Jan nominated Lisa, seconded by Cathy. Motion carried.

The 2023 Community Grants; 2023 Small Business Grants; 2023 K-12 Camp Scholarships; and 2023 Continuing Education Scholarships were presented.

Pam Garceau Memorial Scholarship – Cathy gave a brief summary of Pam's history with the Tinmouth Community School, and the grit and determination that she displayed and to which the scholarship in her memory is dedicated. This year's recipient is Morgan Predom.

The TCF Board briefly convened to elect officers. Lynn and Bess were welcomed to the board. Board elected Todd, Jan, Cathy and Helen as Chair, Vice Chair, Treasurer and Secretary, respectively.

Speed Limit Committee ~ 6/22/23

Present were members Kevin Eaton, Hollis Squier, Tracy Byford, Ray Pratt, Jeff Warfle, and Sherry Johnson (via zoom).

Public present Gail Fallar and Alice Hoisington, and Kim Harbaugh (via zoom).

Members reviewed and edited latest ordinance draft, Ray and Kevin provided information regarding yield and stop signs and distances for certain speed limits.

Members discussed rules/regulations for yield and stop signs, when they are required, allowed, etc.

Route 140 is a town highway, not a state highway despite its name. Question was raised about whether the Select Board could set the speed limit for it – the State erected new speed and traffic signs with a special safety program several years ago.

Members compiled a list of recommendations for the Select Board, agreed to by consensus:

- * Review draft traffic ordinance, have it reviewed by legal counsel for adoption.
- * Obtain and install speed feed back signs for the school zone all three directions.
- * Discuss more productive enforcement from the County Sheriff's Department.
- * Consider adding stop signs on Pent Road, Bliss Road and Journey's End Road.
 - * Consider speed study for Route 140 in various areas.
 - * Flashing light for stop sign in the center of town.

* Education for the community regarding action to be taken regarding enforcement.

Kevin will present these to the Select Board at its July meeting.

Sherry and Tracy volunteered to draft an article for *Tales* encouraging safe driving and explaining the Speed Limit Study Committee's work.

Next meeting will be at the call of the Chair.



Instead of this:	You can use this:		
Household Cleaner	Combine 1 tsp liquid soap, 1 tsp borax, 1 squeeze of lemon, and 1 qt warm water.		
Kitchen Cleaner	Combine 4 Tb baking soda and 1 qt warm water		
Window Cleaner	Combine 1/2 cup white or cidar vinegar and 2 cups water.		
Cutting Board Cleaner	Cut 1/2 lemon and rub over surface and wipe clean. For tough stains, allow to sit for a few minutes before wiping.		
Microwave Cleaner	Place 3/4 cup vinegar and 1 Tb lemon juice in a bowl in the microwave. Turn microwave on for 2 minutes, allow to sit for 2 minutes before removing a wiping.		
Mildew Remover	Dissolve 1/2 cup vinegar with 1/2 cup borax in warm water.		
Air Freshener	Fill spray bottle with water and 10 drops of favorite essential oil.		
Toilet Cleaner	Pour 1/2 cup vinegar, 2 Tb baking soda, and a few drop of essential oil into toilet bowl. Scrub with toilet brush.		
Bathroom Cleaner	Combine 1/3 cup vinegar, 1/3 cup alcohol, 1/3 cup water, and a few drops of essential oil.
