## ~ Annual Appointments and Vacancies in Need of Volunteers ~

The Select Board is reviewing the annual appointment of town officers - from Pound Keeper to Green-Up Day to the Energy Committee. There is a complete list on pages 3 and 4 of the 2023 town report.

The Board of Adjustment, the Planning Commission, and the Conservation Commission all have members with staggered 3 or 4 year terms, so each year a few openings happen.

Currently there are vacancies on the Planning Commission, the Conservation Commission, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, the Website Committee, the Equity and Inclusion Committee, the Energy Committee and the Safety and Wellness Committee.

#### ~ Dog Licenses Due April 1st ~



A current rabies certificate is required. You can call the Town Office if you don't know if your dog needs a shot or not. Fees are \$9 for neutered/spayed dogs and \$13 for

those that are not. 50% penalty is assessed after April 1<sup>st</sup>. You can also license them by mail if you wish.

#### ~ Homestead Declaration ~

This is a reminder that you need to file an **annual** Homestead Declaration with the Vermont Department of Taxes, form HS-122. You must file this to qualify for the homestead education tax rate and to request a property tax adjustment if you are eligible.

You must also file form HI-144 (household income), **due April 15<sup>th</sup>**. This is required even if you do not have to file or pay state income taxes.

If you don't know the name of the variety, a description is good; a photograph is superb.

This is a wonderful way to divide your plants to keep them looking their best and help fund the Tinmouth Continuing Education Scholarship Fund. You can drop plants after April 12th at 148 Channel Road, Tinmouth.

We can always use flowerpots that are 6" or larger, clay or plastic. No small ones, please; the plants we sell are too robust to fit into those.

Volunteering is a great chance to "blossom blab" with fellow gardeners, and maybe learn a few things about different perennials. There are always some orphan plants looking for good homes, too.

We dig and pot up plants from mid-April to early May with the sale beginning this year May 4th and running through Mother's Day, the 12th.


## Old Firehouse Concert Series Starts on April 19 By Lendy Krantz

To the Tinmouth Community,

The warm April sun is a welcome relief from the seemingly endless winter. Snow drops and daffodils have already graced the schoolyard pollinators' garden. Spring is the *season of hope*. Spring is earth's renewal, an event enhanced this year by the solar eclipse on April 8<sup>th</sup>.

School will be dismissed on April 8<sup>th</sup> at noon. There will be no afterschool program. Staff will be leaving at noon as well to view the eclipse and to avoid the anticipated traffic from out of state.

We are also in the midst of testing season. Students in 3<sup>rd</sup> through 6<sup>th</sup> grade are completing the state Cognia tests during April. The testing window extends through to May 26<sup>th</sup> when the STAR 360 testing begins. On average, students are spending 2 hours a week testing.

A hiring committee has been recruited to interview candidates for Tinmouth School principal. The committee consists of two parents, two teachers, one paraprofessional, and our school board member. There were seven parents requesting to be on this committee so a student randomly chose two names from a hat. The paraeducator on the committee was randomly chosen as well from the three who requested to be on the committee. Out of fairness to the folks who applied to be principal, the district formed a committee of six. The six, committee members met, reviewed the interview process, and designed questions to be asked of all applicants. If there is a tie, the superintendent will chose between the two candidates. There are 4 professionals being interviewed the first week in April. The new principal will start on July  $1^{st}$ .

Remember, the school is closed from April 15<sup>th</sup> through April 19<sup>th</sup> for spring break.

This is a family and kid-friendly event, so please bring your young ones so they can share the fun (and maybe learn a little about civic responsibility and protecting our environment).

There won't be a Green Up activity at the school this year, so this is your kiddos' opportunity to be part of the team! People are also welcome to do DIY Green UP by getting bags from the Town Office (bags should be there by mid-April) and cleaning a section of roadside as your schedule allows. But we urge you to come with your family on Saturday morning to help build community momentum for this important and fun activity.

Please dress appropriately for the weather, including boots, work gloves, long pants and long-sleeved shirts (to help avoid ticks). #### ~ Amphibian Crossing Alert ~

You may soon notice some brightly-colored amphibian crossing signs on the roadsides in Tinmouth. These are placed by the Tinmouth Conservation Commission in areas where there are known migration routes for salamanders, frogs and turtles. These animals move on a seasonal basis to their breeding and egg-laying sites and are at risk of being killed by car traffic where their paths cross roads.

Please slow down and avoid hitting animals when you see these signs on the roads. There are especially high numbers of amphibians moving on rainy spring nights, so pay extra attention in those conditions. If you'd like to know more about amphibian migration, go to <a href="https://www.vtherpatlas.org">www.vtherpatlas.org</a>. Please do not hit, move or disturb our signs, many of which are hand-made, and please contact me if you see a sign that's damaged or moved. The signs will be removed around July 1 and stored until next year.

#### **Select Board (SB) ~ 3/14/2024**

Members present (in-person): Kevin Eaton, Judy Gilmore, and Melody Squier

Others present:

In-person: Eric Buffum-Road Commissioner, Stan Martell, Susan Holcomb, Greg Poelker-McKee (RRPC), Caleb Scott, Marshall Squier, and Gail Fallar-Select Board Assistant (SBA)

Via Zoom: Sherry Johnson, Kim Harbaugh, and Rick Fallar

Gail as Town Clerk called the meeting to order, so the Board could re-organize. Board elected Kevin Chair.

Kevin assumed the role and the Board further **re-organized** as follows:

Appointed Member to Tinmouth Pond Milfoil Project Board – Melody

Appointed Liaison to Rutland County Sheriff's Department - Kevin

Appointed Member to the Website Committee - Judy Melody moved to approve the above re-organization actions, Judy 2nded, all voted in favor.

Kevin asked that the Select Board Meeting Rules and Procedures Policy be postponed until the next Board meeting so it could be reviewed.

Citizen's Input ~ Stan Martell, who was hired by the Town to take care of winter road maintenance in West Tinmouth, inquired about comments he'd heard about the Select Board not being happy with his work. The Board advised they were not questioning his work, but were experiencing sticker shock at the increase in cost. The budgeted amount of \$6,800 had not been spent in any of the prior 10 years, but his first two months' invoices were over that amount and the weather had been rather mild. It was noted that the Town no longer provided sand or salt. Stan advised he only plowed and sanded when necessary, and that the Town had been under paying for years. Kevin thanked him for coming, and doing a great job, but advised that the Board will be re-visiting the situation for next winter due to the increase in cost. This year's contract will be honored.

Citizen's Input ~ Sherry Johnson advised that the Town Report contained an error. She had asked to not be re-appointed to the Equity and Inclusion Committee; she did not resign as stated in the report, and later asked to be re-appointed. She wanted to make that clear.

#### Highway ~

Eric reported the road crew has been plowing snow, dealing with mud-season #10, and repairing grader cylinder. He noted that Earle's Trucking had damaged some of the last year's paving while pulling out an Amazon tractor trailer truck that was stuck. He is evaluating the damage.

He asked the Board to authorize ordering the equipment (dump body, plow, wing, etc.) from Viking for the tandem due to be replaced in a year or two. Waiting time is about 18 months. Board voted to approve Viking quote for \$99,700. Eric advised it was not binding, could be revoked.

**Eric reviewed the Highway To-Do List** ~ He is working on many of the items listed, will present plan at the April meeting. GIA work will be on Pent Road, will turn that Y intersection into a T and address stormwater issues in the surrounding area.

He also advised the insurance company's safety list work was nearly done; he is waiting for another fire alarm system quote.

#### **Needs Assessment ~**

Greg reviewed draft survey, noting that the Recreation Committee had revised its questions and he would be attending the Planning Commission's meeting on the 21<sup>st</sup>. Board discussed various topics, supporting agriculture, housing issues, transfer station/salt/sand shed, town plan update, etc. Also discussed were opportunities that the grants presented – most were not applicable to a small town – June 30 deadline for projects – each town gets one. **Financial** ~

Board reviewed FY24 reports and Bills and Orders. Board voted to approve the reports and the Warrants.

ARPA \$'s ~ After brief discussion, Board voted to transfer \$20,163 of ARPA funds to the Town's Equipment Reserve Fund for the buzz blade for the road side mower. Eric will check its arrival status.

**Old FEMA \$'s**  $\sim$  The SBA reported the State had discovered that the Town was due \$4,708 from the July 2017 storm disaster – it was the state match to the FEMA dollars awarded for that event.

#### New Business ~

CLA Redetermination Request ~ Gail, with her Lister hat on, reported that after meeting with PVR staff to discuss the process, and noting that the Listers were on track to complete the re-appraisal on time, it would be prudent to ask that the Request for Redetermination be withdrawn. After brief discussion Board voted to request withdrawal of the redetermination of the Tax Dept.'s CLA/COD, and authorized Kevin to sign.

**Planning Commission's Request to Apply for a MERP grant** (\$4,000) for RRPC help with the energy section of the town plan. After brief discussion, Board voted to approve.

**Speed/Traffic Ordinance Review** ~ The SBA explained that VLCT required Select Board approval prior to reviewing any proposed ordinances, estimate of cost was \$300. Board voted to approve request for VLCT to review the draft revised Traffic Ordinance.

Clarendon Select Board Request Update ~ SBA reported that it was the intent of the Clarendon Board to form a committee with members from all four towns regarding possible school consolidation in the Mill River Unified Union School District. The survey originally proposed for town meeting voters was postponed pending forming a committee.

**Annual Appointments** ~ Board voted to table annual appointments until April. SBA was asked to prepare a list of openings/vacancies and who was willing to serve.

Board voted to reduce the size of the Equity and Inclusion Committee from 10 to 7 members.

Sherry advised that while she was willing to continue as the Town's representative to the Rutland Regional Transportation Council, she felt the town would be better served if a member of the Select Board or the road commissioner attended. Many towns have their manager or road commissioner as their representatives.

**Eclipse** ~ SBA advised that Theresa Dana was working on an event for viewing the near total eclipse on April 8<sup>th</sup>.

**Town Meeting Voting Results** ~ Board reviewed voting data. There was a wide variety of votes for the service agencies – all passed, one by only by 13 votes. It was noted that a number of voters appreciated being able to voice an opinion on the various requests. Discussed having agency reports in the town report for next year.

#### Planning Commission ~ 3/21/2024

Members present in-person: Michael Fallar, Judy Gilmore, Larry Carabeau, Vito Macaluso, and Andy Gilmore

Members present via Zoom: Bob Lloyd, Kim Harbaugh, and Pat Psholka

Others: present in-person: Ann Lundquist, Marshall Squier, Melody Squier, Greg Poelker-McKee – Rutland Regional Planning Commission (RRPC); and Gail Fallar Secretary; and via Zoom: Sherry Johnson

Annual re-organization resulted in Michael being reelected Chair and Bob being re-elected for Vice Chair. Gail will continue as Secretary.

Greg presented an updated version of the upcoming Needs Assessment questions advising that the Recreation Committee had already revised its section. Members discussed questions, what to keep, how to improve them, removed one section, added another asking what folks like about Tinmouth, what they don't, any suggested changes?

Greg will prepare the survey for distribution in April to be returned by the 22<sup>nd</sup>. Survey will be sent out in *Tales of Tinmouth*, posted on Front Porch Forum and the

Town's website. It will be available online via a link or QR code and via paper.

Members then asked Ann and Marshall why they wanted to be on the Planning Commission, there being one vacancy available. Marshall noted he had served on the Planning Commission for 37 years, took a break and was now ready to work on planning issues again. Ann noted that in contrast to that, she moved to Tinmouth 1 ½ years ago, marveled at the town and how it works and would like be involved, to learn, and be involved.

After they departed, members discussed making a recommendation to the Select Board – pros and cons of experience and giving someone new a chance to become involved. Several members noted it was a hard decision, in the end, Andy moved to recommend Ann, Vito 2nded, 7 members voted yes, Kim abstained.

Gail Fallar, Select Board Assistant (the "SBA"), also was present in person and Greg Poelker-McKee of the Rutland Regional Planning Commission (the "RRPC") attended the portion of the meeting relating to the RPPC Survey.

#### **Old Business**

RPPC Survey of Tinmouth Residents Regarding the Town's Recreation Opportunities: Greg Poelker-McKee described the RRPC survey process and shared a draft of the Community Needs Assessment for the Town. The members of the Committee discussed the questions that they would like added to the survey on behalf of the Committee.

**Broomball Event**: The Committee discussed the broomball event (at the temporary skating rink) on February 4 and proposed to have a second broomball event in coming weeks, weather permitting.

#### **New Business**

**Next Event Brainstorm:** The Committee discussed sponsoring another event. Members are to bring ideas for the event to the next Committee meeting.

#### **Old Business**

RPPC Survey of Tinmouth Residents Regarding the Town's Recreation Opportunities: The Committee

reviewed the draft survey questions prepared by Greg Poelker-McKee of the Rutland Regional Planning Commission (the "RRPC") in connection with the RPPC The members discussed the draft Survey process. questions and proposed changes.

**Ice Rink**: The rink was drained and disassembled on March 17th. Cat Yoder, Maureen Fitzgerald-Riker and Jen Galusha will be invited to attend the next Committee meeting to discuss how the rink was used and where it might be relocated next year.

Next Event Brainstorm: The Committee discussed sponsoring another event, including an event for the Tinmouth Fun Day in July. Possible future events mentioned included a pickleball open house for people who have never played before; bingo; and board games (chess). Members should bring their ideas for future events to the next Committee meeting.



#### **Vermont's Trout Season Opens April 13**

MONTPELIER, Vt. – Vermont's trout fishing season opens Saturday, April 13.

Despite lingering snow cover in some areas of the state, the Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department says anglers can still have fun and be successful early in the season if they keep a few strategies in mind.

"Just like any other time of year, anglers fishing early in the spring should adjust their tactics based on conditions," said State Fisheries Biologist Shawn Good. "Trout will become more active with warmer water temperatures. If you can find a good location and present your bait or lure without spooking the trout, you'll have a good chance of catching a few fish, and enjoy a nice day outside."

Larger baits can often be more effective for enticing early-season trout into biting. Spin-anglers should try nightcrawlers, egg imitations, or bright colored spoons and spinners. Fly anglers may find success in the early season by drifting large, more visible flies such as wooly buggers, streamers, or San Juan worms along the bottom in slower pools and runs.

While Vermont offers excellent and diverse fishing opportunities for wild trout, stocking also occurs in many lakes, ponds, streams, and rivers where wild trout populations are low or absent. This generally happens each year once the ice has melted and following spring runoff.


Good also reminds anglers to check the <u>department's</u> <u>website</u> frequently as updates are made to the Trout Stocking page. "This is a great tool for anglers to see what nearby waters have been stocked, as the page gets updated several times per week," said Good. Visit this link

Anglers who like to fish and release their catch don't need to wait for opening day. Nearly all waterbodies are now open year-round to catch-and-release fishing for trout in Vermont. Check the 2024 Vermont Fishing Guide and Regulations which is available free from license agents, and it is on Vermont Fish and Wildlife's website at this link: <a href="https://www.eregulations.com/vermont/fishing/">https://www.eregulations.com/vermont/fishing/</a>


